COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE

HELLO. At the invitation of the editor, I have taken over writing this contribution to the 'Rabitter' given that Terri was planning to stand down from the Borough Council in the May elections. I hope I can do the job as well as she has for many years. Ironically, as I write, it looks as if the elections have been postponed until 2021 as a result of the Corona pandemic.

ANAEROBIC DIGESTER:

At the latest meeting of the Digester liaison panel, there was a 'robust exchange of views' regarding the odour problem. Residents were concerned at press comments that suggested that their complaints could not be verified. That said, it was clear that the Environment Agency had intervened and work was being done to address the problem. Significant changes to the biofilter should have been completed by the time you read this, and other alterations are being made to the underlying design. Work is expected to complete by the end of April, but the most significant improvements have already been made. Residents will be able to tell next time there is a still day: recent storms and windy weather will have blown away any odours before they became a problem.

BEGGARWOOD SURGERY:

The recent Patients' Participation Group received another positive report from North Hampshire Urgent Care, the new operators. With the recruitment of a new Practice Nurse, the nursing side of the service is now up to full complement. The waiting time for routine appointments is now shorter than other local practices. In another sign of the new management being more outward looking, the practice will new issuing its own reports to this and other community magazines as well.

BRIGHTON HILL ROUNDABOUT:

One of the major bottlenecks on the A30 corridor into town is the Brighton Hill roundabout. At its annual budget meeting, Hampshire County Council allocated £20 million for improvements.

GOLF COURSE APPLICATION:

It looks as if the decision on the Golf Course is not now being scheduled for April. A new date is awaited.

BRIGHTON HILL COMMUNITY COLLEGE:

Congratulations to Chris Edwards and his team as the school has filled all its places for next September, with some applicants having to be disappointed. Nothing demonstrates better how a school is regarded than the number of parents who choose to send their children to it.

RAMBLERS ASSOCIATION

The North Hampshire Downs Ramblers group is part of the Ramblers Association. We walk mostly in Hampshire and the surrounding countryside. In the last few months our group has enjoyed both walks and social activities, including a Ladies' lunch at Christmas, which was very well attended. The group are also currently organising a walking holiday around the Isle of Wight. We have had a very wet and muddy Winter and are looking forward to some better weather in the Spring

The group walk on Tuesday, Saturday and occasional Thursday walks which are sometimes a bit shorter for those who do not want to walk the longer distances. The walks cover areas in and around Basingstoke as well as sometimes going further afield.

On our Tuesday morning walks, which are typically 6- 7 miles, we continue to attract many walkers. Even although in recent weeks the conditions have been very poor, with lots and lots of mud, we continue to get out there and walk. Some of the walks have been more urban to give us a break from the mud and puddles.

Our Saturday walks tend to be longer, with fewer walkers, and can sometimes take most of the day. This last quarter our walks have included walking around Bramshill Forest, Kintbury, Banbury and we enjoyed paddling through a very flooded road in the Winchfield area. Roll on Spring!!

Our Thursday walks have included walks around Basingstoke Canal and Tadley.

As well as the walks, the group also enjoys social activities, this includes an Annual Summer Picnic, Boys' lunches, and Ladies' walks and lunches, and the group occasionally organise weekends and days away.

The group have an active path patrol group, who report problems to the local council and also do some work on the paths, which can be as varied as checking waymarking and replacing waymarking discs, minor clearing or even repairing stiles and gates. To date this group has replaced 20 plus gates in conjunction with the local council.

RESTAURANT REVIEW

THE HOGGET London Road, Hook, RG27 9JJ 01256 763009

Without a doubt, the best fish pie ever! This was Madam's conclusion and because it was a generous size she was forced to leave some of the mashed potato topping. It was full of cod, salmon and shrimp. And the side vegetables, verging on al dente, of large carrot battens over shredded cabbage were great as well.

She had started with calamari in a tempura batter and a dish of tartar sauce while I had Palma ham with blue cheese wrapped around a green fig accompanied with a small salad. Delicious.

My main course was also a pie. The specials today, in this British Pie Week, included chicken, mushroom and tarragon but I had the chunky beef cottage pie with cheese topped mash. It was really tasty and I also had the same vegetables.

A pint of Birra Moretti lager and Madam's usual diet tonic with ice and a slice could have been supplemented with the complimentary bottle of tap water. The two flat white coffees were tasty too which came with a chocolate mint. There are changes to the extensive menu daily, which are posted on their web site. A simpler lunch time offering of various sandwiches is available as is their fairly short dessert menu.

The Hogget is at the traffic light junction on the A30 just past the Basingstoke Country hotel on the way to Hook. It is a cosy, welcoming pub that offers an extensive and high quality food selection for reasonable prices. Our bill today was £55.75 plus tip which we thought to be good value for money considering the quality of food we had enjoyed.



COUNCIL INTRODUCES FINES FOR IDLING MOTORISTS

It's not fine to idle – that's the message from Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council who is set to introduce new powers to penalise motorists idling their vehicles.

The council will issue fixed penalty notices to those motorists caught idling while stationary on a public highway from Monday 23 March.

The notices will be issued by the council's civil enforcement officers, community safety patrol officers and environmental officers while carrying out their normal duties.

The \pounds 20 fines will be a last resort and a notice will only be issued when a motorist refuses to switch off their engine.

It's been overyear a since the council launched its Clean Air Campaign encouraging people in the borough to reduce air pollution by using their vehicles less, to stop idling their car engines and to think about the ways in which they can reduce pollution in their own homes.

The campaign has seen the council and partners work with local schools to encourage parents and children to travel to school differently, reduce idling outside the school gates, work with taxi drivers to reduce idling and encourage the use of ultralow emission taxi vehicles. Together with partners including Hampshire County Council's school travel team, Basingstoke Clean Air Campaign and Stagecoach, the council has also supported awareness and education events giving out over 5,000 anti-idling stickers to motorists to place on their car windows.

Cabinet Member for Environment and Enforcement Cllr Hayley Eachus said:"Leaving your engine on while waiting in your car contributes to unnecessary emissions that affect levels of air pollution and greenhouse gases. Many motorists are simply not aware they can make a difference by switching off their engine while waiting.

"Our primary objective is to raise awareness and educate motorists to switch off their engines while waiting, but it is also important they understand that vehicle idling is an offence. These powers enable us to issue a fixed penalty notice for a fine of £20 and these will be issued by our officers when required."



Read Easy launched in Basingstoke last July to provide a free, confidential, one to one coaching service for adults who, for whatever reason, are unable to read or who struggle with their reading. We have had a very busy time with the initial recruitment and training of volunteers for coaching and our management team, as well as publicising our service to help those adults in the area who are in need of it.

The sad reality is that 2.4m adults in the UK cannot read, while 2.5m struggle to read, an estimated 7,000 in Basingstoke alone. On a practical level, this means that even carrying out everyday tasks can be challenging, if not impossible - for example, never going to the doctor as it is too embarrassing to have to read and fill in forms. Being unable to read and write is often associated with depression, isolation, homelessness, crime, low self-esteem and mental health issues.

Last weekend was a milestone for us - we were delighted to have our first two readers complete manual one and are they are now moving onto the second stage of our phonetically based reading programme. We are so proud of them for working so hard and achieving so much in such a short time. They were both absolutely delighted to be presented with a certificate for their achievement, and described in very moving terms the difference that being able to read has made to their lives.

More than just Easter Eggs?


As you read this article many of you may have been affected by the coronavirus or know someone who has. We are facing a difficult time in our community, country and world, the likes of which we will not have experienced before. People are naturally anxious at this worrying time and concerned what the impact will be for them and their families. It is a particular concern for the older people in our community. At Immanuel church we are aware that there will be people who will need to self-isolate for a variety of reasons. This may lead to loneliness or the need for practical support. If the church can help in any way please get in contact with me. This is a time for us all to be good neighbours and support one another. We will soon be celebrating Easter where we remember the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. For many people it is Easter eggs that symbolise Easter but from a Christian perspective, the Easter egg came to symbolise new life in Jesus, the empty tomb or, for some, the stone which was rolled away from the entrance to the tomb. In Medieval times the church painted eggs blood red as a symbol of Jesus. There was also a festival of egg throwing in church, when the priest would throw a hard-boiled egg to one of the choirboys. It was then thrown from one choirboy to the next and whoever held the egg when the clock struck 12 was the winner and could keep it. The UK's first chocolate egg was produced in 1873 by Frys of Bristol. Today Easter eggs come in all sorts of sizes and packaging and my personal favourite is the Cadbury's Crème egg. Easter has always been a special family time for me, exchanging eggs, eating hot cross buns and Easter egg hunts. A verse from the Bible that has been an important part of my life is, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one

- and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." John 3:16. It is a verse that I learnt at Sunday school and it was also written on the large stained glass window at my former church in Chandler's Ford. It is
- a verse that has supported me through the many ups and downs of my life. It is a verse that is important at Easter time.

Things are continuing to improve and patients report much easier access to on-the-day and scheduled appointments and a much more relaxed atmosphere in general within the practice. The older waiting room chairs have been replaced, some with arms to allow those that need it help in getting into and out of them.

Other news is that the surgery is now trialing a new e-Consult service accessed via their web site (www.beggarwoodsurgery. co.uk). This will guide you through a series of questions to help you find the correct solution to your particular health query/problem.

The surgery website allows you to book appointments and request repeat prescriptions. Being able to ask for repeat medication in this manner is particularly useful as, from April the surgery, like others in Basingstoke, will not be accepting requests for medication over the phone - this practice is inappropriate and potentially dangerous as the requests are taken by non medically trained administration staff.

Of course you can still use the services offered by the local chemist to provide repeat prescriptions, drop in a request to the surgery, it can be dropped through the letterbox located beside the dentist surgery if we are closed, or even request a repeat via the post.

To use the on-line appointment and repeat medication service you will have to register with the surgery. This is a simple matter of visiting the practice and asking for the appropriate form, as well as taking with you some form of formal identification. This can be a current Passport or maybe a driving licence and local authority or utility bill (e.g. Council Tax, Water Bill, Gas or Electricity Bill). Once the request has been approved, usually within a couple of days, you will be sent an email from the surgery with instructions on completing your on-line registration.

Running solo vs. running with others

Running on your own let's you set your own pace and can give you some much needed head space. On the other hand, training on your own for a specific race can be a little soul destroying. Getting out the door without a running buddy can be tough enough, let alone the mileage count down when every 0.1 miles can seem endless!

Running with a group can make you feel accountable; you're less likely to back out of a run if you've committed to being somewhere to meet people. Having someone by your side during a tough training session can be a total game changer and really push your performance; a little bit of positive peer pressure can really improve your pace. Also, it's easier to realise your 'comfortable conversational pace', if you're actually having a conversation! When the little voice in your head says ''I can't go any further'' it's helpful to have an actual person there who says ''yes, you can!'' Joining a running club can be daunting – people often run for better mental health, including trying to relieve social anxiety and improve confidence so the thought of turning up to large weekly club runs and groups can be intimidating. When Hatchies are at our most visible, it's usually a sea of blue and yellow and you might think – "I'd love to be part of that!" or "those Hatchies are everywhere – that's a bit overwhelming!"

Whilst some club runs are larger and widely publicised on Monday and Wednesday club run days; people also make friends and choose to run in smaller groups at other times. The main thing is that the support is there, but you can always still choose to run on your own. Head space and time away from Hatchies is just as important. We are always there, ready and waiting, for when you need a running buddy; sometimes that's a couple of others, sometimes that's a group of 20!




