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BEGGARWOOD SURGERY NEWS FROM THE PPG

Councillor Kim Taylor had a meeting with CGH/Operose to discuss the number of complaints that she has received from her constituents, and the quality of care overall in their surgeries. Our Chair and Vice Chair attended this meeting where there was an interactive discussion about the way forward for Operose and its patients in Basingstoke. The following plan was devised to monitor service levels:

- I A full implementation plan with deadlines will be drawn up by Operose and circulated to councillors and PPGs.
- 2 A quarterly progress report by Operose will be circulated to everyone involved in the meeting.
- 3 Quarterly meetings will take place as per the original meeting.
- 4 Contact for surgeries to be circulated to ensure channels of communication are fully open.
- 5 Operose to support PPGs with communicating to patients.

We will keep you updated on this issue as things progress.

SURGERY UPDATE March 2022

We held our first formal meeting with our new providers Operose this month and things seem to be operating fairly well although the changeover and merger of IT systems proved to be more problematical than Operose were led to understand from NHS England. Operose on our behalf put pressure on NHS England IT staff and we are given to believe that things now are back to normal. However, if you are still experiencing problems with your NHS App or unable to order repeat prescriptions via the web please do contact the surgery and they will be able to help you. Operose also reported some challenges in the reception area particularly during the first couple of weeks that the surgeries merged as some staff had previously sanctioned leave owing causing a temporary staff shortage.

The telephone system at Beggarwood is to be upgraded to allow a greater number of calls to be handled and to allow monitoring and recording of calls. This will allow Operose to accurately monitor any possible complaints from patients regarding treatments etc. and take action where necessary. There also seems to be a perception that there is a problem with a lack of people answering the phones but Operose responded that they were confident that the right number of staff was employed in this area but they were investigating working practices within the team. It was also acknowledged that

the quality of the reception staff is more important than that of the GP as they are the first point of call for a patient.

We also reported to Operose that we had received emails via our PPG email address that showed patients are concerned that Beggarwood will stop operating separately and it was clear the surgeries will merge at some stage — even if patients are not aware of this. Operose understood our concerns but asked us to judge their performance over the coming months and agreed that it would be a good idea to hold a Patient Open Evening later in the year (July/August) to meet patients and listen to our feedback. This will take place at the Beggarwood Community Centre.

Social Media and Complaints

We are aware that some social media platforms are receiving many complaints about some of Operose's (CGH) other surgeries. Commenting on these types of platform allows us to talk to others who may have similar issues, but it is not the best way to get help with legitimate complaints. Each NHS provider must have a robust complaints system in place and it is this system that will yield the best results for all. In Beggarwood's case the correct email address for complaints/comments is: nhccg.beggarwoodsurgery@nhs.net or by phoning or visiting the surgery and asking for a formal complaint form. Please note it is important that these matters are communicated in writing in this way they will be seen by the CQC when the surgery is inspected. The surgery then has a set number of days to investigate the situation and respond to your complaint/comment. If you feel after receiving the reply that it did not meet your expectations or did not correctly respond to you then you can then escalate the problem to the NHS Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) again via email: nhccg.complaints@nhs.net or nhccg. enquiries@nhs.net.The CCG will carry out its own investigation and report back to you.

CAMROSE, GILLIES AND HACKWOOD PARTNERSHIP (PPG)

CGH News: A meeting was held on 10th March between local Councillors, Operose, the CCG and PPG, where there was significant discussion about patient dissatisfaction with service at all levels of CGH. Plans are being put in place to address this, with attention to recruitment, training and retention of employees. A new Human Resource system will soon be in place to reduce time taken to recruit staff, and CGH is now registered as a Living Wage employer, paying 10% above the national living wage, and 27 days holiday per year. More support will be given to the PPG in terms of updates, and helping more patients to get involved. Patients with concerns and complaints should contact the practices directly to properly log issues for action. Efforts to reduce call waiting times continue, and are showing gradual improvement.

The problematic E-consult is to be replaced with Dr.iQ, an App which will direct enquiries to the right resource, allowing GPs to deal with more urgent and complex issues. Dr.iQ is a free, NHS online consultation platform, customised for each practice according to patient demographics and needs. Members of the PPG will form part of the initial trial group, and will be trained on how to use Dr.iO. Information can be found at https:// www.dr-ig.com. N.B the App for CGH is not, as yet, in place, and will need to be tested by CGH patients before introduction.

PPG News: Our PPG website is now up-to-date: www.cghppg.co.uk.

The PPG are holding a Patient Feedback Workshop at Brookvale Community Centre on 5th April, from 1900 to 2100. This is an opportunity for you to talk to the PPG, and share your patient experience of CGH over tea/coffee and cake. It will enable us to give feedback to CGH for attention. Free tickets can be obtained via our website. Feedback and output in our next newsletter.

EMPLOYMENT LAW TIPS FOR START-UP BUSINESSES

Starting a new business is an exciting time, but if you are planning to take on an employee, there are various laws, rules and regulations that you should be aware of.

Before recruiting it is important to make sure your business premises are safe and fit for purpose and that you are adequately insured for public liability and also for employer's liability.

An employment contract exists as soon as an applicant accepts your offer of employment even if the contract is only verbal.

It is a must to have a written employment contract at the start of employment to ensure that both you and the employee are clear about what you expect of each other.

There are legal obligations placed on all employers including notice periods, the right to be paid the minimum or living wage, rights in respect of holiday pay and sick pay, breaks, pension provision and rights to time off. Checking the employee's right to work in the UK before the employee starts work is also a strict legal obligation.

The rights to time off include such statutory rights as flexible working, parental leave, dependant leave, maternity, paternity, adoptive and shared parental leave. As an employer you must familiarise yourself with these matters which protect the rights of the employee as well as your obligations in respect of pay during these absences.

You will also need to consider policies and procedures that you will wish to rely on later such as grievance, capability and disciplinary procedures.

If hiring self-employed people initially you also need to be aware that if they are not employees but are workers, then they will still have certain rights including an obligation for you to pay them holiday pay and in some cases sick pay. Even workers hired through an agency acquire the right to be treated in some respects the same as employees after 12 weeks in the business.

Employment law is complex and is constantly changing, with many potentially expensive pitfalls for the unsuspecting. It is imperative that you seek the advice of an Employment law specialist, such as Gill Brown, Jacqueline Kendal or Anna Burdett at a very early stage so that you do things correctly from the outset.

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COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE

DOCTORS' SURGERIES: I attended a meeting at the hospital organised by County Councillor Kim Taylor at which we were able to meet Operose, who have taken over the running of the Beggarwood Surgery as well as Camrose, Gillies and Hackwood in this part of the town. Also in attendance were the Chair and Vice Chair of the Beggarwood Patients' Participation Group and Councillors from wards in which Operose have a presence. Operose shared with us some of their plans for the future of their operations in Basingstoke, including the planned introduction of an important phone app that patients will be able to use. We made it clear that we want phone calls to be answered in the surgery, as at Beggarwood, rather than a centralised call centre. Operose shared some confidential information regarding their business model, and I hope to examine that with them in more detail to see how well it maps onto Hatch Warren and Beggarwood's demographic profile.

PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP: the most recent meeting of the Beggarwood PPG was on I 6th March and was the first to take place with the new management in attendance. It discussed practical issues arising from the merging of the Beggarwood and CGH operations, the need to maintain an effective reception facility and synergy that could be generated within the larger group.

CAR MEETS AT SAINSBURY'S: For the second Saturday in a row there was a car meet at Sainsbury's on 5th March. This one was nipped in the bud by the Police, who turned up promptly following immediate calls from local residents. The Police had earlier dispersed a meet elsewhere in the Borough, and when reports came in of another problem developing in Hatch Warren, they moved over and stopped people from entering the car park.

FUTURE PLANS FOR THE CAR PARK.

The more I dig into the circumstances surrounding the re-emergence of this problem, the more indistinct the answers seem to get. I was told by Mitie, Sainsbury's agents, that the Automatic Number Plate Recognition equipment in the car park had been damaged and was not operational on the night of the first meet. However, I was given different information by Sainsbury's themselves, who said that the ANPR was indeed operational, in which case the car meet attendees could receive fines for overstaying the ten-minute limitation that

exists after the store closes. I was told by Mitie that the Police did not turn out for the second meet, when in fact they did, and dispersed it. The positive news is that Mitie have responded to my request for a meeting of stakeholders and their stated intention is to install a permanent ANPR system in the next financial year that is less prone to be being vandalised. Also, Mitie arranged for their Mobile Disruption Unit (a marked CCTV van) to be redeployed from its previous location and be in Sainsbury's car park for the weekend of 12th March, to record any activities but more importantly to act as a mobile deterrent. That weekend saw no meet take place.

STAKEHOLDERS' MEETING: I requested a further meeting of Stakeholders to discuss the resurgence of Anti Social Behaviour and this has been called for after the cut-off date for this report, so more next time. One idea I want to examine is putting a barrier on the car park (overnight staff could have an entry code).

PARKING RESTRICTIONS: You may wish to familiarise yourselves with the parking notices that have been put up in the Sainsbury's car park. In particular, waiting is now restricted to ten minutes after I Opm at night - enough to visit the cashpoint and leave. This is part of the process of bearing down on the antisocial car meets, but I would hate to see unwary innocent users being caught out.

ROAD WORKS, HEATHER WAY: | wrote to Hampshire's Officers about the large pile of spoil in Heather Way associated with the works being carried out by South East Water and asked for a safety review because it was obstructing sight lines for drivers exiting Lavender Road. An Inspector carried out a site meeting and discussed these concerns with SEW, as a result of which it was agreed that the use of Portable Traffic Signals and reducing the overall size of the spoil heap would help alleviate the issue. But the traffic lights were not a success: they caused traffic to queue out onto the A30, which is unacceptable. It was therefore decided that the junction of Lavender Road be closed until the scheme is completed and the Borough Council made an order on 11th March. The fact that an emergency order has been necessary makes me feel that the works were poorly planned and the likely inconvenience to motorists and residents did not feature sufficiently highly on South East Water's agenda.

SAINSBURY'S CAFE: It looks as if the café at Sainsbury's Hatch Warren is one

of those slated for closure. They have not stated what the future of that space will be - perhaps a franchise will take it over as happened in the past. I have spoken to the store manager asking for clarification.

ROAD ADOPTIONS: I have received more queries about the adoption of roads in the area round the Co-op. The process of adoption stalled over the alleged inclusion of a parcel of land into a private garden, which put an important drainage access point out of reach. Attempts to resolve the matter by consent have not been successful, which means that a tribunal date must now be set to try to resolve the issue. Strictly speaking this is a dispute between the homeowner concerned and Taylor Wimpey, the developers, so Hampshire County Council is not party to it, other than providing statements of fact. Until this is resolved, it remains the developers' responsibility to repair potholes and faults.

POSTS IN DANEBURY ROAD: it looks as if the posts that I reported as having been removed from the field in Danebury Road have been replaced. These are important as a defence against illegal trespassing.

STORMS ACTIVITY: Storms Dudley, Eunice and Franklin saw winds up to 80mph hit Hampshire. In the three days at the height of the bad weather, Hampshire received 2,500 reports of issues on the highways, of which 1,200 were for tree-related problems.

COUNCIL TAX REBATE FOR ELIGIBLE RESIDENTS: The Borough Council has announced that it is planning to contact residents this month about delivering the £150 Council Tax rebate to those households who are eligible (properties in bands A to D)..They are also warning that it may take longer than usual to answer the phones because of an anticipated upsurge in queries. Although they didn't put this in the note they sent out, I understand that the process will be easiest for those who pay their Council Tax by Direct Debit.

UKRANIAN REFUGEES: I expect that many households across Hatch Warren and Beggarwood will be asking how they might help Ukrainian refugees who make it to this country. The County Council stands ready to give help, and has created dedicated web pages at www.hants.gov. uk/ukraine if you want to know more.

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The phrase, generally attributed to, but denied by the actor Sir Michael Caine "Not a lot of people know that!" could be applied to some of the information that came from the talk at the latest meeting of the Probus Club of Basingstoke.

The talk, titled *Play Your Cards Right* by Michael Luck, an expert in card payments systems, was about the history of credit cards and how their security has changed over the years with advancing technology. One fact that instantly connects to the phrase above was that a pin number, used to confirm the user, is not seen by the bank when making a payment but stays within the chip on your card.

The first on the scene was the Diners Card in 1950 followed by the American Express card in 1958, both of which were printed on cardboard. This goes some way to explain why today being made of plastic they are still called cards. Amex changed to a plastic card with embossed lettering in 1959. These two early ones were in fact charge cards in that the full amount had to be paid off each month.



Barclaycard arrived in the late 1960s with a credit card as we know them today. Zip-Zap imprinters used three-part payment slips which the user had to sign.



The magnetic strip, as still seen today, was introduced in 1970 and contained the name, card number, expiry date and some other data. Point of Sale electronic terminals in 1980 used to swipe the magnetic strip which was considered secure as there were no computer viruses and hackers in those days. The latest chips contain even more information which means that in all probability the magnetic strip will eventually vanish.

It was the French, in 1975, who developed the use of a chip placed on the reverse of the card while it took until the early 2000s for the Safeway supermarket chain being the first in the UK to use this technology.







Contactless cards

were introduced into the UK in 2008 and had very slow acceptance as people were concerned that if their wallet was close to a terminal that a payment just might be actioned. Young people, as with many technological advances, saw the ease of use and this was especially so when in May 2011, the restaurant chain

McDonald's introduced this no signature required system. With most of their sales transactions below £20 this was seen as a great benefit by the company and today they have one of the most sophisticated card payment programmes in the World.

The Covid pandemic saw the rest of the UK rapidly come to accept this system especially when the maximum limit was raised to £100. However, this also brought about increased fraudulent activity if a card was stolen as no signature was needed.

What next, you wonder? The future has arrived and as from March this year, as banks and retailers boost their security systems, customers will be sent a code by their bank to enter online or at a terminal in a retail establishment as proof that they are who the card says is the account holder. This is called Strong Customer Authentication (SCA). This will not happen on every occasion, perhaps one in four, especially for small value transactions, but if a retailer is not ready for the new process there could be times when a card is declined.

Some retailers are already using this system when large values are involved or when a customer uses a web site for the first time. There is a problem that a user might be confused as not all banks use the same criteria. PayPal is included and Apple Pay on mobile phones already use a code, fingerprint or facial recognition to approve the payment.

If there weren't so many dishonest people in the world these changes to the security systems would be unnecessary but the banks are doing their best to ensure that only you access your money.

OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

This is the time of year when the birds are busy singing and finding a mate. On both sites (throughout

the year) there are a good number of *Blue Tits* and *Great Tits*. The females build the nest on their own laying eggs in early April; the *Blue Tit* lays 8 - 10 eggs and the *Great Tit* 7 - 9 eggs. They nest in holes in trees or walls and will readily take to nest boxes. The *Blue Tit* usually has only the one brood each year but the *Great Tit* may have a second brood. There have been sightings of *Long-Tailed Tits*; such a sweet pretty bird with a noticeably long tail and they never seem to rest. They often move around in groups and are always on the move flitting from branch to

branch. The voice is very distinctive — a thin high-pitched 'see, see, see'. Sadly there have been no sign of their nests on either site — but that doesn't mean there are none. The nest is an amazing little oval or round structure made from moss, cobwebs and feathers. There is probably too much disturbance for these birds to feel comfortable enough to build their nests.

Hedgehogs will now be out and about so perhaps you could put out food for them. Tinned cat food or the dry cat food (not fish based or flavours) is okay for them. As you may know the number of hedgehogs has declined greatly over the last years so they need all the help we can give them. Hedgehogs love to eat slugs. If a slug has

ingested slug pellets that contain metaldehyde then that is lethal for the hedgehog. It is good news that the use of slug pellets containing metaldehyde is now banned for the better protection of wildlife.

"We hope to connect the community to the extraordinary difference it has made to the lives of its neighbours and telling stories is the perfect was to do that. We are sure that everyone is connected some way, they may know someone who has had our care, may have worn a crazy hairstyle for Mad Hair Day or brought in donations to a store," said Sue O'Flinn, Communications Manager at the Hospice.

"We are really excited to be celebrating this anniversary. It gives us an opportunity to look back and reflect on how far we have come but also to get share with the community where St. Michael's is heading as we expand our services.

HATCH WARREN UNDER FIVES

This month has flown by at Hatch Warren Under Fives.

We've been enjoying the brighter weather and are making plans for some gardening. The children have given us ideas of what they'd like to grow so we'll soon be busy planting vegetables and flowers.

We recently celebrated Mother's Day and the children made beautiful cards. We have also had fun celebrating pancake day, St David's Day, St Patrick's Day and Holi Hindu. We are now in the lead up to Easter and enjoying lots of Easter arts and crafts and egg hunts in the garden.

The role-play corner has been set up for camping this month, which has been a huge hit with the children. And staying with the theme of the great outdoors we have been learning all about mini beasts - and hunting for them! We have been on walks through the woods uncovering logs and leaves to see if we can discover any little mini beasts hiding. As part of their mini beast topic the children painted symmetrical butterfly pictures, they have used their fine motor skills to trace the names and shapes of spiders and worms, they have counted spots on ladybirds and made their own ladybirds using clay. The children also used cardboard boxes to create their own bug house.

We celebrated World Book Day in March and dressed up as our favourite book characters. We had lots of lovely costumes and characters in preschool. We also really enjoyed reading the children's favourite books.



Our small group work this month has been focussed on maths and phonics. We have been identifying numerals, looking at simple adding and subtracting and learning to read number sentences. In our small group phonics work we have been listening to the initial sound in a word and matching it to a letter.

Our older children will be learning which primary school they are going to over the Easter holidays, so we are eagerly awaiting to hear the big news when we get back to preschool after the holidays. Next term we begin our preparations for the transition to big school. We will start by giving the children lots of mark making opportunities and activities that strengthen little hands for handwriting.

Here at Hatch Warren Under Fives we love to make marks. This can be using pens, paper, paintbrushes, chalks, pens or even using our fingers to make marks in soil, jam or flour.

Why is Mark Making Important? Mark making gives children the opportunity to explore imaginatively, physically and creatively, to test their ideas and extend their play. Writing begins long before a child can physically hold and control a pencil or crayon effectively, the journey to becoming a confident writer begins at birth and mark making is the foundation that underpins a child's ability to write. Remember children learn that marks have meaning by watching adults writing. Encourage your child to 'write' with you e.g. shopping lists, phone messages, memos and greeting cards.

LOOKING TO LIFE BEYOND BRIGHTON HILL COMMUNITY SCHOOL

As Y8s start the process of selecting which subjects they will continue to study to GCSE (guided choices), I decided to speak to Mr Watkins our Careers Lead at school and asked him a few questions about careers and guided choices and the resources available to support them to choose subjects to study at GCSE and perhaps even their careers in the future!

What resources can students use to help them decide on their subjects?

- Unifrog is an online platform that has all the information you need to know about careers and post 16 opportunities. It is essential that students use this resource especially if you are stuck for subjects or do not know what you need for a particular career.
- The student zone in the careers + enterprises section of the school website
- The careers corridor which has lots of posters showing the requirements of different careers

www.careerspilot.org.uk provides careers information and tools for I I – I 9-year-olds

Should students choose a wide or limited range of subjects?

When it comes to picking subjects, you have an option. Either a wide variety of choices or a limited variety of choices. It really depends! For example, if you have absolutely no idea what job you want when you are older the best choice for you is to choose a wide variety of subjects that you enjoy (e.g. History, Music, Spanish, Business) however if you know what you want to be when you are older then you should choose subjects based on

your future career (students can find out in the career corridor or on Unifrog).

What should a student do if they do not know what subjects to pick?

Firstly, it is OK not to know. It is completely natural however if it is stressing you out then here are a few tips to help you:

- Unifrog: In this situation it can really help. Firstly, go onto
 the career's library and like careers that you are interested
 in. Secondly go back to those careers and read their
 descriptions. There you will find what subjects you will need
 to get this job.
- Connect real-life with subjects: This sounds a bit confusing but what it is, is finding a hobby or something you like doing and connect it in all the possible ways with different subjects; an example would be if you enjoy drawing as a hobby, that will link to the subjects Art or Design Technology
- Go to the corridor of careers: Find a career you like and see which subject it links to. Or do it the other way round!

It is good that there is so much help for students when making their guided choices.

AN INDEPENDENT UPDATE ON LOCAL ISSUES

DESTRUCTION OF TREES – Hounsome Fields and the old Basingstoke Golf Club development is continuing with more than fifty houses on Hounsome Fields occupied already. Three arms of the new roundabout for the main access to both sites are complete and now work on construction of the secondary access for the Golf Club site has started. This has led to more trees being destroyed. It will be an "in" only access when development is complete but it will be in and out during construction. This has meant that trees on the central reservation have been felled. Yet more trees will be felled when the fourth arm of the roundabout is constructed, adding to the loss of trees on the old course fairways.

OAKDOWN FARMWAREHOUSE PROPOSAL – Newlands has submitted a third warehouse application on the Oakdown Farm site. The first two applications; one for four warehouses and a second for one large warehouse, rumoured to be for Amazon, were refused. This new application is for three warehouses, the largest of which would be for occupation by Lidl. Newlands claim a reduction in HGV traffic generated by the proposal but it would add to the pressure on the Southwood traffic lights and M3 Junction 7 from Hounsome Fields and the Basingstoke Golf Course. This is before the thousands of homes are built between Oakley and North Waltham as is suggested for the revised Basingstoke Local Plan.

There were 42 members at the meeting held on Wednesday 2nd March when the Group held their Annual General Meeting. The Chairman opened by welcoming everyone and said how fortunate it had been that the 2020 AGM went ahead just before the lockdown so that only last year's had not taken place. In giving his report he commented on the help given to him by both the members of the committee and all the others who helped at the monthly meetings which re-commenced in August. The Secretary, Treasurer, Membership Secretary and Welfare Officer then gave their reports and the officers and committee members for the coming year were appointed.

Chairman - David Cowling, Vice-Chairman - David Dance, Secretary - Tony Brazier, Treasurer - June Brazier, Membership Secretary - Sonia Waite, Welfare Officer - Christine Broadbent, Speaker Secretary - Maggie Hatton, Raffle Organiser - Pam Bowen.

A resolution was then unanimously passed to extend the current subscription year until the end of August with succeeding years then running from September to August.

APPRENTICES OF ALL KINDS

We are Apprentice fans, but my husband frequently says he wouldn't employ any of them! Recently, the candidates had to design and market new baby food, but the results were so bad that no-one won. I have NEVER seen that happen before. Jesus had apprentices too, only we don't call them that. We usually call them disciples. Just as the TV candidates often

make spectacular errors so did Jesus' apprentices. The number of times they get it wrong. Peter wants to prevent Jesus from going to Jerusalem because he doesn't understand why Jesus wants to go there if he knows he is going to die. None of them really understand why Jesus chose a donkey not a war horse to ride into Jerusalem.

Jesus was trying to make a point that God's kingdom is a kingdom of love and gentleness. Not war, strength and power. Putin's view of his 'kingdom' is built on war, strength, power and fear as he viciously attempts to take control of Ukraine. This is not the kingdom of God that Jesus was trying to bring in. I hope and pray that by the time you read this article that the war will have ended and the Russians will have retreated from Ukraine.

More apprentice errors — Peter again, initially doesn't want Jesus to wash his feet at the Last Supper. When Jesus explains that he has come to be a servant not a master then Peter wants to be completely washed all over. All the male disciples, except John, have deserted Jesus at the cross, possibly through fear — only the women remain. The two disciples wearily walking down the road to Emmaus don't even recognise the resurrected Jesus and Thomas after the resurrection doesn't believe the others have seen Him. You see as apprentices they're not doing a great job.

Alan Sugar's "You're fired!" has become quite a catchphrase. But unlike The Apprentice we don't get fired as Jesus' apprentices. Jesus doesn't send Peter, or Thomas or Cleopas (one of the disciples on the Emmaus Road) home. He doesn't say, "You're fired!" No! Jesus keeps on giving them and us the opportunity to improve; to be better people again and again and again. It is called forgiveness and is one of the key ideas in the Christian faith. Not easy at all, especially if we have been hurt or betrayed.

This Easter I wonder how we can all become Apprentices in learning how to bring in a kingdom of love, gentleness and peace- not war and aggression. Jesus tells us the answer in two simple sentences. "Love God with all your heart, soul and mind. Love your neighbour as yourself." That means everyone, including people we do not like or find difficult to be with. Mike adds "We still need to raise £36,000 this financial year to maintain service on Tuesdays and Thursdays and donations are always welcome."

RESTAURANT REVIEW

OTTOMAN TURKISH RESTAURANT

Although fairly well travelled I have never visited what has become a popular holiday destination for many readers and therefore never eaten any of their food – until now.

A visit to the Ottoman Turkish Restaurant at the Top of Town has now overcome one of life's missing experiences and created a very positive impression of that far eastern Mediterranean country at the crossroads betwixt Asia and Europe.

It was a wet Friday lunchtime for our visit and initially I worried that as the place was empty was there something that others knew that prevented their attendance? Apparently not. The situation changes from 4.00pm in the week until they close at I 0.00pm. With a potential 60 covers it must be a different place at those times.

Madam's son was visiting from his work and abode in Luxembourg, and he knew his way around the extensive menu which fortunately for us provided descriptions of each offering. A dish of Turkish bread appeared as if by magic accompanied by two dips, one a yogurt raita and the other spicey vegetable.

Madam, for starters, had fried calamari, her son grilled halloumi cheese and I had Torpedo King Prawns. Mine were superb and the others said the same. The main dish caused some indecisions but eventually Madam had Chicken Shish which had so much chicken that some was boxed up to take home. Her son had a most interesting dish of Lamb Beyti that came in a shallow metal dish on top of a cage containing a flame. It left lava rocks in the shade for effectiveness in keeping the food piping hot. Mine was Lamb Kavurma, minced lamb that had been rolled in a special bread and sliced on the bias so appeared open. Some rice and a salad garnish completed the square plate.

They have a small list of desserts but for some reason we were not offered any. Not a problem as we were all replete.

Our drinks were a sparkling water, a freshly squeezed orange juice and a bottle of Peroni. A bottle of tap water was also provided. The son had an Expresso which he described as real Turkish coffee, Madam and I had an Americano with milk.

It was Madam's treat as she only sees her son a few times a year and the bill came to $\pounds 95.10$ which was considered reasonable in view of the super quality we had enjoyed.

They do deliveries within a radius of 3 miles between 4 -10 pm, but we shall not be using this service as we shall definitely be back.











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
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
