#### BEGGARWOOD SURGERY NEWS FROM THE PPG

Following the meeting last month hosted by Kim Taylor with senior directors of Operose we have now received from them an action plan as to how they propose to monitor and improve services offered by them to the patient group of both CGH and now of course Beggarwood as they also hold our contract. Further meetings with Operose and ourselves, again hosted by Kim Taylor, are planned for later in May/ June to monitor and review the plan.

#### SURGERY UPDATE – April 2022

Two new doctors have joined the CGH team, a Dr Robinson and Dr Ambrose who will both come on board in the next few months. A receptionist is being sought for Beggarwood to fill a vacancy.

It was reported that during the last few weeks an occasion had arisen when Beggarwood surgery had reached a staff/ patient capacity. Fortunately, CGH has a Duty Capacity Response Team, which enabled urgent patients from Beggarwood to be seen at Camrose. We asked if patients were more pleased just to be able to see a doctor or whether there were complaints about having to travel to Camrose. There have been no complaints about the travel involved. We applauded the decision to open the response team at Camrose to Beggarwood patients. We also asked if people are being told why they are being asked to go to Camrose, and Operose confirmed that a clinician would explain the situation and advise patients about why they need to go there rather than being seen at Beggarwood.

We continue to receive good comments on face-to-face appointments being made available, even at short notice. Also, that the reception team at the surgery are being as helpful as they can in helping patients sort out the confusion that NHS England has caused with the integration of patient records and the inability for some patients to order prescriptions online.

We also noted that Beggarwood no longer has its own dedicated Practice Manager; instead we now have a General Manager (Claire Osbourne) covering all four CGH sites.

Operose said CGH was learning some good ways from Beggarwood and has taken these on board. A new phone system went in last week, which will enable the staff to listen to calls and track any problems.

#### Beggarwood/Operose Open Meeting

The Beggarwood Community Centre has been booked by our local M.P. Maria Miller to host the Community Feedback session previously mentioned in our last communication. This will take place on 16th July starting at 10:00 hrs and is scheduled to last I hour. Please come along if you can as your feedback will be useful in helping Operose understand any concerns you may have and enable them to, if necessary, fine tune their services at Beggarwood and the CGH practices.

#### Social Media and Complaints

Remember, as stated in our previous newsletter, Social Media platforms can be used to give vent to our feelings relating to what we judge are let downs in the service we expect. However, the best way to improve any service we receive is to formally complain to the right people at the right time. In our healthcare issues the correct way to do this is by using the prescribed NHS England channels. In Beggarwood's case the correct email address for complaints/comments is : NHCCG.BEGGARWOODSURGERY@ NHS.NET or by phoning or visiting the surgery and asking for a formal complaint form. Please note it is important that these matters are communicated in writing. In this way they will be seen by the CCG (Clinical Commissioning Group), and the CQC (Care Quality Commission) when the surgery is inspected. The surgery then has a set number of days to investigate the situation and respond to your complaint/comment. If you feel after receiving the reply that it did not meet your expectations or the surgery did not correctly respond to you then you can then escalate the problem to the NHS Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) again via email : NHCCG.COMPLAINTS@NHS. NET or NHCCG.ENQUIRIES@NHS.NET . The CCG will carry out its own investigation and report back to you.

#### CAMROSE, GILLIES AND HACKWOOD PARTNERSHIP (PPG)

The PPG are pleased to report that the recent Patient Feedback Workshops proved to be an effective way of gathering your comments and ideas in respect of CGH and their service to patients. The valuable information we now have from the 86+ patients we saw over the two Workshops, is being collated from over 600 post-it notes, and this will be fed back to CGH and Operose Health. The PPG Newsletter, along with previous copies, can be read on our website, www.cghppg.co.uk. If you would like to receive a regular, digital copy, you can request this by supplying your email address in the box provided.

**Covid vaccinations:** Spring booster vaccinations for those over 75 by 30/6/22, are being done at Jameson House by appointment only, as are vaccinations for 5-11 year olds. Patients will be notified by their surgery in respect of booking these. Festival Place clinic, next to the Tiger shop, is now open for walk-ins for any vaccine, including 12-15 year olds with an accompanying parent, plus the spring booster for those unable to get to Jameson House.

**CGH News:** Our PPG public meetings highlighted a number of areas of complaint, including access/making contact with the surgery, the actual appointment, call wait times, prescriptions issued/rejected and hospital referrals/feedback. CGH are fully aware of the work required to improve patient services, and acknowledge that the difficulties patients are experiencing cannot continue.

A development plan has been prepared in response to the Cross Party Councillor Meeting held in March. The planned improvements include a mystery shopper programme reporting back to management on customer service, full engagement of the PPG, new working patterns to improve call answering at peak periods and reducing call wait times, a clear time window for clinician call back, Dr.iQ fully implemented and e-consult decommissioned. The time frame for this, and more, is April to December, 2022. A Cancer Project to support patients diagnosed with cancer during and, post treatment, is planned to soon be operational. With 42080 patients, CGH received 23000 calls during March, and carried out 16000 appointments. Per week, this equals 3402 telephone appointments, 1535 face to face appointments and 700 online consultations. There has been a 65% increase in call volumes in under 2 years.





#### PLANNING FOR WORSE CASE SCENARIO

We often like to think of ourselves as invincible. A lot of the time we are. I am constantly amazed by what business owners manage to achieve whilst also balancing the never-ending challenges of running a business.

Sadly, sometimes life events can bring a halt to our best laid plans. I recently helped a family friend through a very difficult situation which I wanted to share so that you can ensure you have the relevant plans in place for you, your business and your family.

#### Background

My family friend was happily married with three children. Her husband was a one third shareholder in a professional service company. He was in his early 40s and was diagnosed with terminal cancer. Very sadly, he died six months later.

I became involved, after his death, and it was clear that little planning (which was not that unsurprising given his age) had been put in place. This left his wife and children in a difficult situation.

There was no life insurance in place, and by the time he received his diagnosis, it was too late to get any insurance in place. There was also no provision in any of the company's constitutional documents as to what happened with the shares.

As a result, my contact was left with a large mortgage

to pay, three children to support and minimal income as she, at the time, was retraining.

Given that most business owners are growing their business ultimately for their family's benefit, I wanted to set out some of the points which you may want to consider.

- 1. Set out a clear process in the articles of association or shareholders' agreement as to what will happen on the death of a shareholder.
- 2. Consider whether a cross option agreement may be suitable for your business model.
- 3. Ensure you have adequate life assurance in place for you and your spouse/ civil partner
- 4. Make sure you have a Will in place and that it is up to date
- 5. Consider having a lasting power of attorney for both financial and health matters.
- 6. Consider what the effect on your business would be if you were unable to work for a prolonged period or were to die.

I highly recommend that you do spend to time to consider these points and discuss them with your fellow shareholders and family.

#### **COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE**

**CAR MEETS:** Mitie (Sainsbury's agents) have installed the permanent Automatic Number Plate Recognition system in the supermarket car park. Following a period of testing, they will be in a position to start enforcement actions on people who stay longer than ten minutes after the store has closed. They are publicising the change using posters and an external banner. In addition, a speed bump scheme for the car park is being costed. We will need to monitor how the new restrictions are enforced: the targets are the people who behave in an antisocial manner, not the responsible citizens who take eleven minutes rather than ten to go to the cashpoint.

A30 SPEED LIMIT: the Borough Council has made an order to impose a temporary 30mph limit on the A30 between Saunders Way and the new Hounsome Fields roundabout. This is designed to slow traffic so that works to construct development access roads can be completed safely. The order came into effect on 18th April and will last for a year, though they hope that it will be lifted after 7 months if the works have been completed. That would mean November, if all goes well.

**STARBUCKS AT SAINSBURY'S:** On 23rd March, Sainsbury's submitted planning application 22/00885/ADV. The proposal was seeking permission to erect a Starbucks fascia sign above the entrance to the café at the Hatch Warren store. The sign will advertise the new Starbucks concession and therefore confirms the expectation that some of us had, that Starbucks are moving in to take over the existing café. This will come as welcome news to everyone who feared that the facility might close down altogether.

**SOUTH EAST WATER ROADWORKS:** Many people will be breathing a sigh of relief that the South-East Water road works on the A30 have finished. The hold-ups caused by the three-way lights at the Hatch Warren roundabout were severe, and caused a lot of traffic to divert through the estate roads. The huge pile of spoil in Heather Way has been removed and the emergency closure of the junction with Lavender Road, that it caused, has been lifted. The verge has been levelled out, though it will take some time for the grass to grow back. My feeling is that these roadworks caused more disruption than they should have, and they could have been better planned.

**BRIGHTON HILL ROUNDABOUT:** We are entering the period when work on the carriageways starts, requiring diversions and changes. The first moves include a footway diversion near the Brighton Hill Retail Park. In addition the bus stop on the eastern side of the A30 Winchester Road at the Brighton Hill Retail Park will not be in use. A temporary bus stop will be in place on Pack Lane near Homebase for Brighton Hill Community School pupils travelling home to Oakley.

**BEGGARWOOD SURGERY:** I expect there will be a report in this magazine from the Patient Participation Group, so I won't duplicate that. I observed the most recent PPG meeting, and I must say that I find the engagement from the new operators to be positive and constructive. Many people feared that things might go backwards towards the terrible situation that existed a few years ago, but I feel reassured that everyone wants to avoid that.

**BIODIVERSITY:** The Borough Council is continuing the Hatch Warren and Beggarwood Biodiversity Improvement Zone initiative for this year. It has surveyed the sites and found that, for the second year in a row, more species have established themselves. A total of 213 grasses and wildflower species have been recorded across the eight verges and open spaces - an increase of 34% over last year. In addition 135 invertebrate

species including butterflies, bees, spiders and wasps have been spotted. The Council has run the BIZ since 2020 and during this time the selected areas have been cut differently and regularly monitored to improve habitats for wildlife and flora and to create green corridors for wildlife to travel from one area to another.

**FENCE IN DANEBURY ROAD:** following the recent storms, damage was caused to the fence in Danebury Road where trees fell. I have reported the damage to the Borough Council who have undertaken to make repairs. It is taking a while to do: I suspect there is a backlog of similar tasks to complete after the violent storms.

**ANAEROBIC DIGESTER:** Disappointingly, there has been a flurry of reports of odour pollution again from the Digester. No doubt this will be discussed at the next meeting of the Liaison Panel which, at the time of writing, was being organised for the end of April.

**MEMBERS' GRANTS:** the County Council is looking to restart its Members' Grants facility earlier than usual this year, so that Councillors can consider applications relating to the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Officers are hoping to re-open the Hampshire scheme in mid-May.

**UKRAINE APPEALS:** I am delighted at the positive responses generated for the victims of the war in Ukraine. Hatch Warren's Sainsbury's has posted its thanks to everyone who has donated towards its Ukrainian Crisis Appeal, whilst Hall and Woodhouse (Holly Blue and Portsmouth Arms) has reported that they have raised almost  $\pounds$ 60,000 across their outlets. Many people are considering hosting Ukrainian refugees which is great, though I have a concern: the danger exists that the relationships between the hosts and the refugees might break down, and we need to be clear what will happen then to people who have already lived through so much trauma. I have raised this with County Officers and the Council is pressing the Government for a 'rematching' service so that the families may be offered new hosts.

BOBBY SCHEME: This service may of interest to residents in Hatch Warren and Beggarwood: the Blue Lamp Trust runs an initiative called the Bobby Scheme. This provides free home security visits, long-life smoke alarms and advice to vulnerable residents, particularly the elderly and victims of burglary and domestic abuse. A full crime prevention and fire safety survey is carried out by a specialist trained and police-vetted fitter. The service will provide both general and specific crime and fire prevention advice to improve residents' home safety. When appropriate the fitter can install items such as locks, spy-holes, door chains and smoke alarms. The service is completely free to those who are vulnerable due to age (over 65), circumstance, disability, or being a victim of household crime. Anyone can make a referral including individuals, friends, family, doctors and social workers via the Blue Lamp Trust website - https://bluelamptrust. org.uk/bobby-scheme-landingpage/ - or by ringing 0300 777 0157. As a Councillor, I am sure that I could facilitate a referral.

**PINCH OF SALT!** I read with a mixture of amusement and puzzlement, the sales pitch from Linden Homes' for their newbuild properties on Hounsome Fields. They are describing the site as "... located off Winchester road, in close proximity to the town centre." Given that Hounsome Fields is one of the most distant developments from the town centre, the 'close proximity' claim does seem to smack of 'poetic licence'!

#### PROBUS HEARS ABOUT CREATURES GREAT AND SMALL

Most of the senior readers will remember times during the 1950s when the only "foreign" animals school children would see were either those lucky enough to visit a zoo or see Tarzan films at the cinema or on small black and white televisions in programmes such as David Attenborough's Zoo Quest and those of intrepid explorers Armand and Michaela Dennis and under water film makers Hans and Lotte Hass.

Today, it is a different situation with both the increase in foreign travel that allow face to face experiences with exotic creatures and locations but also for the considerable amount of television programmes that these days highlight concerns about global warming with its danger to animals, plants and humankind.

The speaker, Stephen Thair, himself a member of the Probus Club of Basingstoke, sought to bring his concerns about the way our planet is heading at the latest meeting of this club for retired professional and business managers.

The RSPB's recent Big Garden Birdwatch had over 700,000 participants and spotted 11 million birds. This may sound a lot, and there have been some increases in certain species, but the organisation calculates that in the last 50 years, from 1972, this country has lost over 38 million birds. Having said that, and because they are more house types of birds, you will probably see more species in your back garden than on a walk in the Hampshire countryside.

The speaker cited many reasons for changes in the world's ecology. Global warming has

meant that in the UK plants are flowering a month earlier than they used to. Animals operate by day length which means that orchids now flower before bees have emerged to pollinate them. Increased rainfall brings planned housing developments into question with either dangers of building on traditional flood plains or as is happening close by in the Arun valley existing water extraction may be having an impact on the environment and any new developments need to be neutral in the consumption of water:

Spain has severe water shortages and strawberry growers in Andalucía have been illegally tapping water for some time. This has now been regularised by the regional government due to a combination of political and commercial pressures.

Over the years there has been progress on several fronts. Whaling was a substantial industry, including in Britain where a large fleet was based in Whitby, but these days the International Whaling Commission set catch limits to preserve stocks. In 2020 only Japan and Norway were whaling commercially although four countries conducted aboriginal subsistence hunts. Today whale watching has become a tourist activity.



Reductions in many fishing fleets throughout the world have been necessary as several varieties have been

fished out and Cod stocks in the Grand Banks off Newfoundland are still only at 10% of the level seen in 1960. Herrings, around Britain, are now said to be in good numbers following a ban from 1977 – 1983.

Tins of Tuna now claim that the contents have for some years been caught by lines rather than by nets but even this method attracts criticism from the RSPB as Albatrosses are sometimes themselves caught on these long lines.

A success story has been the Tequila fish that was extinct in the wild in Mexico. It has been reintroduced to its native area after being bred in an aquarium at Chester Zoo. Rewilding at the Knepp Estate in West Sussex has seen the return of Nightingales, Turtle Doves and breeding White Storks.

And last year at another English site 72 pairs of Common Crane fledged 40 chicks with the result



that today there are more in this country than in the 17th Century.

Tropical rainforests, known as the lungs of the world, are subject to extensive logging activity. Extensive deforestation of biodiverse forests takes place in parts of the world to grow palm trees for their oil, destroying the habitats of already endangered species like the Orangutan, pygmy elephant and Sumatran rhino. Civilisation is relentlessly advancing towards them so that today 70% of rain forests have a road within one mile.

The UN COP-15 conference about biodiversity was held remotely in October 2021 due to Covid. The follow-on COP-15 part 2 due at the end of August at Kunming in China to review progress and finalise the post 2020 biodiversity framework has been postponed due to Covid. The key aim is to make 30% of the Earth's land and seas to be protected areas by 2030. Alarmingly none of the twenty goals set by governments at a similar conference in 2010, to be achieved by 2020, have been fully met.

The pressure is on us all to do something to bring these targets back on track. Time is running out.

### OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

The petition to get Basingstoke Council to designate Old Down as a Local Nature Reserve

(LNR) has sadly not achieved sufficient support from the public. There were only just over 3,000 signatures to support Old Down as a LNR. To oblige Basingstoke Council to debate the issue there needed to be at least 4,000 signatures. This means there is no obligation on Basingstoke Council to debate the petition. However, the petition was placed on the agenda at Full Council on 24 March but without the 4,000 plus signatures it was not debated and the decision was taken to look at the issue later in the year. This does not look very hopeful for Old Down. Considering how many people use Old Down for



walking (and many say what a wonderful site it is), it is surprising that more people did not bother to support Old Down as a LNR. LNR status gives protection to a site as a statutory nature reserve; a place for wildlife and people. Without this protection there is risk of the site being lost to another use or development. Old Down is an amazing site – in particular the native wild flowers in the meadow and its location with views across the town and towards Kingsclere. It is a site that should be preserved. So please support getting LNR status for Old Down.

Recently Basingstoke Council considered a number of sites in the borough for LNR status and has now come up with just the one, Crabtree Plantation and Black Dam Ponds. Unfortunately, not Old Down. So Basingstoke Council will now be concentrating on Crabtree, meaning that is unlikely there will be any resources or interest in working towards giving Old Down LNR status.



#### HATCH WARREN UNDER FIVES

We had a wonderful spring term at Hatch Warren Under Fives; it's hard to believe we're now into our final term!

This term the children learnt all about the season of spring and all about life cycles. In the lead up to the holidays we enjoyed lots of Easter activities, including Easter cooking and Easter egg hunts through the woods. We have also been hard at work in the garden and the children have been planting seeds and looking after the herb garden.

As part of our life cycles topic we have been growing our own butterflies. It's very exciting that the caterpillars have now changed into cocoons so we think we're close to hatching our butterflies. The children have also been using the laptop to research the lifecycle of a caterpillar and compare what they have learnt online with what they have seen with our real life caterpillars at preschool.



Our older children had some very exciting news over the Easter holidays – they found out which schools they will be going to in September! It's always lovely to hear all about the "big" schools and who is going where. So this term is when our "school readiness' begins. We will begin to introduce lots of activities to prepare our bigger children, for example, can the children change into their PE kit by themselves? Can they independently wash their hands and open the food in their lunchbox? We'll also start to focus much more on numbers, health and self-care and communication and language. School readiness is described in the foundation stage as "Children reaching a good level of development in the prime areas and literacy and mathematics".

Some of the expected characteristics that should be displayed by a child to show school readiness;

- Independent in toileting
- Able to dress themselves
- Understands expected levels of behaviour
- Confidence and self-esteem
- Can take turns and share
- Can sit still for a short period
- Can separate from parents/carers
- Communication and language skills needed to communicate needs and listen to others
- Can actively learn and creatively and critically think

Some of these characteristics may of course be difficult for all children to achieve and this shouldn't leave parents or practitioners concerned that a child isn't school ready.



He had titled his talk "Getting to Good – A School's Journey" and went on to explain that when he arrived at the school it was OFSTED rated as 'Requires Improvement'. It is an 11–18 mixed comprehensive Foundation School with at present 1094 pupils, including 84 Sixth Form Students, and nearly 200 staff. He gave an outline of his own journey to becoming a Headteacher and then gave details of the measures being taken to ensure that at the next OFSTED inspection the school would receive a 'Good' rating. After giving an insight of the problems faced from having a diverse catchment area, with a higher than average number of children having special needs or not having English as their first language, he explained the challenges that were faced in introducing these measures. After two years progress was being made with better pupil behaviour and attitude, an improved curriculum and a fully committed teaching staff. All of this was being done with the aim of providing the best possible education to the children to equip them with the skills and ambition to succeed in life through the school motto "We Dream, We Learn, We Grow."

The group's next outing will be to Hatfield House on Thursday 19th May and then on Thursday 14th June there is a Cruise on the Thames from Runnymede with, lunch included, followed on Thursday 14th July by a visit to Hever Castle.

### APPRENTICES OF ALL KINDS

#### How big is your world?

Unique to humans is our ability to change the size of our world at will. At the click of a button, we can travel across the world, in the palm of our hand we have a multitude of news-streams. Equally, when a life-altering event occurs, such as having a baby or an accident, our world shrinks, and the news headlines become irrelevant as coping with our day-today challenges is enough.

Astronauts, seeing Earth from outer space experience something called the overview effect (coined by Frank White). Feeling incredibly small, but with a powerful self-awareness at the same time. NASA astronaut Ron Garan explained, while looking down at the Earth he felt "flooded with emotions", "as if time stood still" but sadness came over him as "despite the overwhelming beauty...serious inequity exists on the apparent paradise...nearly one billion people don't have clean water to drink...injustice, conflicts, poverty...". From this perspective he felt nothing was impossible.

As Christians we believe Jesus Christ was God's son. God in human form. In Jesus' time, there was no internet so he couldn't travel across the world at the click of a button. His concerns were solely to do with the people he was with in the here and now. Jesus met with the sick, the poor and the outcast from society.

Jesus didn't travel very far, only on foot or by boat but he would pull huge crowds, sometimes over 5000! Jesus would be asked questions, for example "who is my neighbour?" or "who will get into the kingdom of heaven?". Jesus often didn't answer questions directly but would answer in parables. This would help people to look at things from a different perspective. For example, learning the importance of humility and our neighbours may be someone from a very different culture to ours.

If Jesus was around today, what messages do you think he would have for us? Would he carry the latest iPhone in his pocket? What apps would he use? Who's at the fringes of our society? These are the people he would spend his time with. When I was at Kew Gardens a couple of weeks ago, I found the Treetop Walkway breath-taking. We'd only taken 108 steps up into the tree canopy but I felt the new perspective, looking across London, allowed me to realise both how small and how powerful I can be. I am but one human. In my role as a counsellor I only ever sit with one person at a time. Sometimes I feel as though my world is small, it's just me and the person in front of me. I'm no world leader but it doesn't make my work any less important. While it's incredible that we have the technology to find out what's going on across the world, it's what we do in the here and now that's important. We have the power to think like Ron Garan (astronaut), if we put our minds to it, nothing is impossible.

### **RESTAURANT REVIEW**

#### **BREWDOG BASINGSTOKE**

BrewDog, the Scottish based brewer known for their range of beers, have taken over the premises of what had been the Coal restaurant in the corner of the outside dining square near to the Vue cinema. There is plenty of competition here and so the offering from BrewDog needs to be unique. And so it is.

They have set out to attract a range of customers from those that want to attend their beer schools to those wanting to hot desk (somewhat difficult the day of our attendance as their wifi was down) to doggy parties – yes you can have a party for your canine friends through to those like Madam and I that wanted to test out their food.

Selecting a drink was not simple as the offerings were all unknown brands but Madam had a half pint of German style Pilsner, and I had a pint of Czech style pale lager.

We both chose a burger in preference to chicken wings that were the specialty of the day. Madam had Chuck Norris which was butter milk deep fried chicken while I had the Jackpot burger consisting of a 7 oz beef patty, chorizo sausage and black pudding. I thought that the BBQ sauce poured over mine prevented me from tasting the meat while Madam considered the chicken to have been fried for too long as it was dark brown and quite difficult to cut. A cup each of fries completed our choices.

We decided to have a sweet otherwise this review would have been incomplete. A short selection of just seven options which really were variations of each other, and madam had two scoops of ice cream with salted caramel sauce, and I wanted to have the caramel butterscotch sundae. As there was none available it was replaced with vanilla ice cream with caramel sauce toped off with some nuts and aerosol cream.

The BrewDog style has cutlery in soft drink cans, although there was none on our table, and the food is delivered on what appear to be small tin trays with a large steak knife plunged through the burgers. The ice cream was in a small, enamelled pie dish and my dessert was in a small screw top jar. Perhaps it is all part of being carbon neutral and everything appearing to being recycled.

The booking system gives time slots of an hour or 90 minutes but even though we were ten minutes early for our table which had been booked for an hour it took over 90 minutes to complete our lunch even though there were few customers. The bill came to  $\pm 54.18$ , and I suppose that these days artisan burgers do cost this level. Incidentally, while there was a short starter menu and an even shorter one for children, coffee was not on the menu.

Their business model must be successful otherwise why would they open in Basingstoke. We concluded that we are a different generation to their target customer base and will probably forego visiting again.




