These elections gave everyone in the ward an opportunity to select the candidate who would recommend your interests on Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council. There are 7,549 people on the electoral register eligible to vote -31.5% of these people actually voted resulting in the winning candidate receiving 10% of the possible vote. There will be another opportunity to elect a local councillor next May. BEGGARWOOD SURGERY NEWS FROM THE PPG

As you are now all aware our surgery is now being operated by the Operose Group of companies. This is the same group that operate the Camrose, Gillies and Hackwood (CGH) surgeries around our area. The transition from our former operator (NHUC) seems to have gone reasonably well with a couple of exceptions due not to Operose but NHS England. Obviously, the plan from Operose is to maximise their operation and we will eventually become fully absorbed into CGH This will have some partnership. benefits to the Beggarwood patients in that we can gain access to a broader range of services and holiday cover will be less traumatic etc. We, the Beggarwood PPG, are now aware of plans that Operose would like our PPG to join the larger CGH PPG and we are seeking your views on this proposal. This might mean that our "voice" within Operose could become diminished but on a more positive note the CGH PPG could add extra weight to any problems that arise.

What are your views on this? Please give this some thought and use the Beggarwood email address given above and below to let us know your thoughts.

Good news in that staffing levels at Beggarwood, both in the number of doctors, nurses and support staff, are fully up to plan with any necessary temporary shortfalls either occupied by locums or from the wider Operose group.

Scams

It has come to our attention that a particular scam involving Covid and the need to take a PCR test is being propagated via a NHS type text either sent supposedly from the surgery or NHS England. This fake text asks you to pay for the PCR test and requests your bank details. Be aware that NHS will NEVER ask you for payment in a text or an email.

Any Complaints?

If you feel that you have not been dealt with correctly by the surgery or perhaps not had a good experience in dealing with either the surgery or a member of staff you can make a formal complaint. In Beggarwood's case the correct email address is : NHCCG. BEGGARWOODSURGERY@NHS. NET or by phoning or visiting the surgery and asking for a formal complaint form. The surgery then has a set number of days to investigate the situation and respond to your complaint/comment. If you feel after receiving the reply that it did not meet your expectations or did not correctly respond to you then you can then escalate the problem to the NHS Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) again via email: NHCCG.COMPLAINTS@NHS. NET or NHCCG.ENQUIRIES@NHS. NET. The CCG will carry out its own investigation and report back to you.

PPG email address

To gather a wider patient view of Beggarwood Surgery we have decided to publish a **NON-MEDICAL** email address that will be viewed by the PPG team so that we can correlate your views into our regular meetings with the practice. Suggestions for input might be :

- The ease of booking an appointment or call back

- Feedback on the reception and medical staff

Once again, we stress this is for Non-Medical feedback as we are not medically trained and the email address will only be monitored on an irregular basis. If you have an urgent medical problem please contact the surgery directly or ring III.

CAMROSE, GILLIES AND HACKWOOD (PPG)

Over April and May our PPG has been busy analysing the output from our two workshops held at Brookvale Community Hall. Thank you to those that attended. See feedback at http:// www.cghppg.co.uk/

Busy Busy - Changes at CGH Currently 13 PPG members are trialling a new App called Dr IQ for the surgery. Once launched, probably later this year, it will allow patients to make appointments, request prescriptions and more 24/7.

CGH is also implementing a system called Docman 10. This allows documents to be transferred and filed electronically, to and from hospitals on the same system. So a lot of work and training is going on to implement the new systems, which will make admin much quicker and easier.

Self-Care You will be aware from the media that there is a shortage of doctors. This has resulted in a huge workload for our GPs and hospitals. The NHS is promoting selfcare awareness, so we can better help ourselves in the first instance. Information is available to read on self-care on CGH and NHS websites, but of course you should make an appointment if you need to.

Elective Care If you have been referred for a hospital appointment you can get a rough guide of the waiting time for an appointment, operation, or treatment by going on to this web site https://www,myplannedcare. nhs.uk/. This does not include cancer treatments.

Covid Jabs Spring boosters are ongoing for those who will be 75 by June 30th 2022. Immunosuppressed people will receive an appointment. 5-11 year olds are being vaccinated at Jameson House by appointment only. Walk-ins for 1st, 2nd, and boosters, including Spring boosters, continue at Festival Place, which is next to the Tiger shop, 12-15 year olds must have an accompanying parent. It's important that all under 18s have 3 months clear of Covid, everyone else 28 days. Festival Place is open 7 days a week from 11.00-17.00.





WHY IS MY CONVEYANCING TRANSACTION TAKING SO LONG?

It is a common grumble that conveyancing takes longer than expected. Buyers are keen to own their new properties as soon as possible but the average transaction takes around 12 weeks from offer to completion.

Several factors can contribute to delays:

Identification - Conveyancers are required by law to verify the identity of clients and the source of their funds. Ensure you have ID documents and proof of deposit readily available at the very start of the transaction.

Lost Documents - If have carried out work to a property you are selling, get planning and building regulation paperwork together. Check you have your Final Certificates. A surprising number of sellers do not request the building inspector for a final inspection so do not receive their Completion Certificates.

Lost Title Deeds - Although most properties are now registered with the Land Registry some unregistered land remains, particularly where the property has remained in the same family for many years. If you have original deeds, please keep these safe.

Missing Rights – When viewing a property make a point of checking for private access roads and shared driveways, private or shared services such as drainage, and other unusual features.

Service Information Packs - Properties that are leasehold or have an estate service charge require these, and they can take anything between 2 to 8 weeks to be returned by management companies. If your property is subject to a service charge, let your conveyancer know early.

Missing Landlords and Defective Leases - If your property is leasehold or subject to ground rent, ensure you have your latest ground rent receipt or freeholder contact details available.

Finance Problems - Speak to your bank or financial adviser before making an offer. If you are funding your purchase from savings, check how long it takes to release the funds - a Life Time ISA can take up to 3 weeks to be released. If you are receiving a gifted deposit, you need to provide information on the source of the funds to your conveyancer and mortgage lender, so submit your paperwork early.

Search Delays - Most local authorities can return an Official Local Search within two weeks, but some require longer as not all records are readily available. Further searches may be required in particular circumstances like former mining areas or relative to the particular property such as a Highways Search where there are access issues.

Whilst delays can be frustrating, there may be factors outside of your conveyancer's control. It is important that the documentation is correct and complies with legislation to avoid future problems, so you need to be flexible with target dates and review these regularly as the transaction proceeds.

The Battle with Blackthorn

Blackthorn is a wonderful resource as it provides sloes for birds, animals and gin makers. However, as we say, you can have too much of a good thing. If you don't keep an eye on it, it can spread quickly and it propagates by shallow root suckering. There are several patches in Down Grange Meadow that have grown quite quickly over the past two or three years because of our restricted ability to get out due to Covid. We have now started tackling this job using "tree poppers" which, if used correctly, can do a great job. The key to success is not just to get rid of the whip or shrub, but to also lift as much of the root as possible.

A Community Payback session in early February got to work on our most obvious clump of blackthorn by the side of a desire path, which was pushing the path further into the Meadow. After some tuition, they went at it with a will and cleared a significant quantity.

Payback participants like jobs where, at the end of a session, the result of their efforts can be seen. The following day at a regular volunteer work party one of our members carried on the good work. This is an example of what can be achieved with good ground conditions, technique, patience and a lot of effort.

COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE

FENCE MENDED: I am pleased to see that the fence in Danebury Road, alongside Chatsworth Green, has been repaired. I reported the damage, which was caused by falling trees, following contact from a local resident shortly after the storms that hit Basingstoke in the Spring. The new wood looks obviously fresher against the weathered wood of the undamaged sections, but they will undoubtedly even out over time.

LONG CROSS LANE: I am also pleased to report that the sunken brick crossing behind Sainsbury's has been repaired. I reported it a long time ago and was increasingly concerned that the dip in the road was getting worse. The bricks have now been removed and replaced with Tarmac. The surface is now much smoother - let's hope it lasts!

WAREHOUSES AT JUNCTION 7: At the time of writing, the decision of the Development Control committee for the warehouses application at Junction 7 was approaching (due 18th May). I wrote to oppose the application, and Maria Miller MP has given notice that, in the event of approval, she and her colleague MPs will ask the Secretary of State to call in the decision. This is because of its significance in the contest of the potential new hospital on the other side of the A30.

ACTION AGAINST CAR MEETS: Mitie, Sainsbury's agents, have installed speed humps to make the car park safer and at the same time reduce the amount of space that 'doughnutters' may have to misuse the car park at night. Together with the newly-installed Automatic Number Plate Recognition cameras, it is hoped that there is now a range of measures in place that will successfully deter future car meets there. New signs are now in place all round the car park, stipulating how long drivers may leave their cars. In summary: three hours during store opening times and ten minutes outside those times. If you use this car park, it would be worth familiarising yourself with them.

COUNCIL ELECTION: On May 5th, Samir Kotecha (Conservative) was re-elected to be Borough Councillor for Hatch Warren and Beggarwood for the next four years.

ON-LINE HUSTINGS: Hatch Warren and Beggarwood ward saw an innovation in the local elections this year, in the form of an on-line hustings event. Hatch Warren and Beggarwood had the longest list of candidates in the Borough and all seven were invited. In the event, five took part. It was organised by Stacey Hart and chaired by ex-CouncillorTerri Reid. Following the event, the recording was placed on YouTube. It will be interesting to see whether this initiative will be repeated next year and whether it will spread to more wards. Hustings used to be an important part of elections but by-and-large they have died out. The ability to hold them on-line, and peoples' familiarity with Zoom post-COVID, may make a difference.

POSSIBLE MIS-USE OF BEGGARWOOD LANE: I have picked up on social media the suspicion that some people are using Beggarwood Lane as a racetrack. I have asked for more details but, at the time of writing, have not received any. Please let me know if there is, indeed, a problem.

The **BRIGHTON WAY CYCLING AND WALKING ROUTE** has been opened. This allows pedestrian and cyclists to be completely segregated from traffic along this busy road. It runs between Sullivan Road and the Brighton Hill roundabout which is currently being increased in capacity.

CAMROSE DECISION: The Planning Inspector has ruled in favour of the developers who want to build on the Camrose, the

old football ground. This raises the question of whether the plans for a link road through the site will be resurrected. I have written to ask that question.

ANAEROBIC DIGESTER: A meeting of the Liaison panel was held on 27th April. The meeting discussed signage to the site, and the recent reports of odour pollution. The cause of the odour incidents is being investigated, but Biogen (the operators) wanted to complete the exercise before offering a commentary. Biogen shared the disappointment of local residents that there are still issues and offered an assurance that the company will do whatever is necessary to address them.

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING: The Hatch Warren and Beggarwood Community Association's Annual General; Meeting is being held at 7.30pm on Wednesday 8th June. It is being hosted via Zoom to enable everyone to take part without having to leave home. The Community Association is such an important part of our lives in this area that it is important to ensure it is properly supported. They need a minimum of 25 HWBCA members to achieve a quorum. Membership renewal is easy and costs $\pounds 10$ per year per family.

THANK YOU: I was sorry to read that Richard Curtis is leaving Hatch Warren's Portsmouth Arms public house. His innovations and energy transformed the business and he was a tower of strength during the lockdowns. The community owes him a heartfelt 'thank you'.

CLIMATE CHANGE EVENTS: The Borough Council is advertising that grants are available to help fund community events and activities focused on climate change during the Great Big Green Week, taking place from Saturday 24th September to Sunday 2nd October. Community groups, not-for-profit organisations, town and parish Councils, charities and schools can apply. Applications in the range £200 to £4,999 will be reviewed monthly till 30th June.

GRANTS TO HELP UKRAINIAN REFUGEES: The Leader of Hampshire County Council has agreed that community and voluntary organisations may apply for funding through the Leader's Community Grants for projects that are intended to provide community benefit and help local communities thrive. Supporting refugees in the community fits well with two of the key aims of the scheme which are to help people in Hampshire live safe, healthy and independent lives and to enjoy being part of strong, inclusive communities. Applications will be considered from Parish and Town Councils and local branches of national charities (where the support being provided is delivered specifically in Hampshire). Further details are available by contacting ccbsgrants@hants.gov.uk.

LOCAL TRANSPORT PLAN: Hampshire County Council is inviting residents to comment on its new Local Transport Plan. They want to hear what people think about the vision for future transport and travel infrastructure, which will affect the way everyone travels around Hampshire for work, education and leisure. They have opened a consultation on the draft Local Transport Plan (LTP4) which is open until 26 June 2022. The benefits of having an arranged trip to Salisbury Cathedral manifests themselves with small nuggets of information that evade the casual visitor. Such things came to the fore when members and wives/ partners of the Probus Club of Basingstoke visited Salisbury Cathedral and to Arundells, situated in Cathedral Close, the home of the ex-prime minister Sir Edward Heath who is buried in the cathedral.

A guided tour of the cathedral was only able to gloss over the surface, but it was enthralling learning about the foundation of what has become known as the cathedral that moved. The original cathedral shared space with the local garrison but relations soured so much that the Pope gave permission to build a new place of worship. An arrow was fired and where it landed would be the site, but it hit a deer that eventually died where the cathedral now stands.

The foundation stone was laid in 1220 but the eight hundredth anniversary could not be celebrated as the building was a vaccination centre during the Covid-19 pandemic.

The dimensions and logistics are extraordinary. It took only 38 years to build and used 60,000 tons of stone, 2,800 tons of oak and 420 tons of lead and all this sits on foundations of only four feet. Several rivers pass beneath the building and the presence of water maintains the firmness of the ground. The water level is regularly checked with a dip stick.

This constant supply of water is used in the modern font which is over ten feet across and has overflowing spouts at four corners clearly demonstrating the style of infinity pools. In opposition to this is the world's oldest working mechanical clock which has no dials but rings the hours. For a church of such size the cathedral does not possess a change ring of bells typically seen in our churches.

Salisbury Cathedral houses what is claimed to be the finest of the four remaining copies of the Magna Carta, signed by King John in 1215. This is on permanent display in the Chapter House.

A short stroll diagonally across Cathedral Close sits Arundells, now known as the Prime Minister's home. It was home for the last twenty years of ex-prime minister Sir Edward Heath and was bequeathed to



a charitable foundation set up in Sir Edward's name following his death in 2005.

Parts of the house go back to the 13th century and six architectural periods are visible and it is set in a two-acre walled garden that stretches down to the confluence of the rivers Avon and Nadder. with amazing views back towards the spire of Salisbury Cathedral.

Inside the house has been largely left as it was when Sir Edward lived here with gifts displayed from world leaders such as Richard Nixon, Chairman Moa and Fidel Castro and many photographs depicting a life spent in politics.

Only taking up sailing at the age of 50 Sir Edward became a successful sportsman. There is a collection of models of Morning Cloud yachts, which is the name most people remember when Sir Edward was the owner and skipper of the winning British crew of the Sydney to Hobart yacht race. Because of the sail number 2468 was allowed to be transferred, Sir Edward named four subsequent boats to also be called Morning Cloud.

As well as paintings of his boats the house is decorated throughout with original paintings, some by famous artists including two by Sir Winston Churchill, L S Lowry and Augustus John. There are beautiful collections of ceramics, glassware and sculptures and treasures from the Far East - including hand painted Chinese wallpaper, and a stunning collection of Japanese woodblock prints. Many bronze sculptures can be seen in an adjoining





building with life size busts of Sir Edward Heath and HM Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother. Some depicting other famous people are available to buy but need a fat wallet.

The house is open from the middle of March to 1st November this year, with guided tours on Tuesdays which provide the visitor with a greater sense, not only about

its last inhabitant, but also the great history of this house so connected to Salisbury Cathedral.

At Brighton Hill School, our Spring Term Deep Learning Day is an opportunity for students to delve deeper into topics relating to keeping healthy and safe. Whilst these topics are covered the 'My World' curriculum delivered during tutor sessions, some topics are of even more benefit to students when there is more time for discussion and response to what they have seen and heard.

Y7s were able to explore the dangers of illegal drugs, alcohol and tobacco; safe relationships online and offline; and how bacteria & viruses spread, the role of antibiotics and vaccines.

Y8's learnt and used First Aid techniques; explored the dangers of online relationships and how to manage anxiety.



Y9's learnt about the importance of self-examination, the science of blood, stem and organ donation;

the media's portrayal of body image and stereotypes; and what drugs, alcohol and tobacco do to you mentally, as well as physically and the legal implications.

YIOs covered elements of the SRE (Sex and Relationship Education) curriculum: STDs and contraception were delivered by the NHS Solent Sexual Health team, HIV; consent and students revisited drug and alcohol abuse.

YIIs spent time with the Science and Maths teachers for exam preparation and with options teachers to develop their coursework.

The students were really engaged and judging by the feedback from them, they found the day very useful!

The next Deep Learning Day will be 'Careers' themed as we continue to prepare our students for life beyond school.

OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

Every spring migratory birds arrive in the UK to breed - birds such as the *Swallow*, *House*

Martin, Chiffchaff, Willow Warbler, Wheatear, Whinchat and Cuckoo to name but a few. In this area, however, in past years the species and numbers arriving have declined. A few years ago migratory birds would have been seen on and around both Old Down and Beggarwood but it is particularly noticeable this year that none have arrived. This is most likely as a consequence of loss of habitat. So many of our local fields, woods and green spaces are being lost to house building. A migratory bird you may have already heard this spring (and may have been lucky enough to see) is the Cuckoo. Sadly you are unlikely to hear one on Old



Down or Beggarwood - there has been no record for some years. Countrywide *Cuckoo* numbers have been on the decline for some years due to habitat loss. It is always lovely to hear one's first cuckoo in the spring - heralding in spring and the warmer weather. The Cuckoo is a summer visitor (arriving mid-April onwards) coming all the way from Africa. Generally they do not stay over here very long, some returning to Africa as early as late June. It is a very distinctive looking bird with blue-grey upper parts and a white and black striped belly. Cuckoos lay a single egg in the nest of another bird - always small birds such as the Reed Warbler and the Dunnock. Each year it can lay up to a dozen eggs each in a different nest.

At the time the group was planning its

FOSTERING MYTHS

Fostering is a commitment that could change more than one life for the better - but there are also many myths out there that are giving fostering a very bad reputation.

One Basingstoke foster agency is on a myth-busting mission to dispel some of the commonly held myths surrounding fostering in a bid to encourage more people to come forward and consider looking after vulnerable children.

Foster parents come from all kinds of backgrounds, cultures, and walks of life. They are from all corners of the world and types of homes. Just as every child is unique, every foster family is unique too.

Every year thousands of new foster families are needed in England. As of 31 March 2021, there were 45,370 fostering households and 76,640 foster carers in England. Between March 2020 and March 2021 the number of children in foster care grew by around 11%.

Regardless of their background, foster parents make a huge impact on the lives of the children that they support. Meet some of Orange Grove's foster parents who are encouraging others to come forward.

Myth I - "Foster children have massive behaviour issues and they will trash your house" Myth busted by lan and Lynne, parents for the last year

"It is a common public misconception that every single foster child or teenager out there has behaviour issues and will be disruptive. This simply isn't the case! We know it happens, but I think that is probably a big hurdle for people considering fostering because like us, you could possibly hold back because of this myth about foster children's behaviours. Every child is so different, and so you can't have just one blanket vision of what a foster child looks like."

Myth 2 - "Age is a limiting factor when you want to become a foster parent" Myth busted by Suso, aged 73, foster parent for 23 years

Twenty-three years ago, Suso, now aged 73, was inspired to become a foster carer by his wife Ruth, who was a nursery nurse for several years but always dreamt of extending their family.

However, in 2009, Ruth sadly passed, leaving Suso to look after their foster children alone.

Suso said: "Since my wife died, fostering has really helped me to keep busy and to focus on other things. Ruth inspired me to become a foster carer and it was always her dream to have a big family, so I'm glad I can fulfil this and make her proud, even at the age of 73!"

Myth 3 - "You have to commit to fostering full-time if you want to significantly change a child's life" Myth busted by Karen, aged 62, respite foster parent for almost 5 years

"Our first foster child came just for the weekend to give both him and his full-time foster parents a break. We had a great time and really enjoyed our weekend together. He continued to come and stay with us for respite. He said to me that we were like his 'foster grandparents', which was just so heart-warming to hear.

"We were able to be the one constant for him, whenever he needs a respite placement, he comes to us, and that's good. Everything that a foster parent does, whether it's on a respite or ongoing basis is the same. If we have a child for one night, it is still vital that we know everything possible about fostering, we are all doing the same thing."

Myth 4 - "You have to have your own children to be able to foster"

Myth busted by lan and Lynne, foster parents for the last year

"You don't have to have your own children to foster. We're doing a great job and weren't previously parents ourselves."

"We felt inspired to become foster parents as we thought it was time in our life to give something back. We haven't got children of our own, so we thought, let's try and do something different. Not having children of our own didn't hold us back in any way".

Myth 5 - "I couldn't foster because I'd get too attached" *Myth busted by Jim and Jeanette, foster parents for the last 18 years*

"Foster caring is not a job, it is a vocation and they aren't our foster children, they're our children. Watching them grow, become lovely young people and do something valuable with their lives is wonderfully rewarding. We just want to offer them a place where they can always go back to if they ever need to, our home will always be their home. People shouldn't worry about attachment, they should worry about the quality of care they are providing.

"We're big believers that a great difference

can be made to the children's lives with just a bit of love and affection. And, of course, looking after children, regardless of age, will never be a walk in the park. But the rewards are infinite."

This was not a planned visit. It was just one of those things that happened because another arrangement had gone awry and suddenly we had some time available in the middle of the day. I had never previously frequented this Italian style food chain, however Madam had been for lunch with her granddaughter some time ago and was keen that I should try the place for myself.

It was a pleasant experience. The place has an Interesting Mediterranean style of décor with a large back lit wall devoted to a saying by the Italian film maker, Federico Fellini, "Life is a combination of magic and pasta." This is reflected in a simplistic but comprehensive menu offering from pizzas, pastas, specialities, salads and desserts. Clearly, it is a well proven formula as there are 120 such outlets in Britain.

A nice touch was the complimentary shot glass of lemonade to toast together. Madam started with a dish of green olives and I had Chicken Lecca-Lecca. This was four breaded chicken breasts with spicey tomato dip and garlic mayonnaise. Not to be confused with chicken goujons. Very tasty.

Our main courses were Asparagus Pancetta Carbonara Frilly Tagliatelle, which Madam will be happy to have again, and I had Fettuccine Bolognese which, again, was very tasty. Everything being freshly cooked in the open kitchen.

The dessert menu had an abundant range of gelato, rich tarts, cheesecakes and Tiramisu but we both had the coffee and cake offering which gave a small slice of blood orange and chocolate tart with a regular Americano with cream.

Drinks had been a slimline tonic with ice and slice for Madam, and I had a small Peroni. The overall cost was \pounds 52.55 which we felt was reasonable value considering the good quality food.

I did not see a children's menu, but they must have one as there were families with children of all ages with plenty of highchairs for the very youngest. All in all, it is a reliable family restaurant and well worth a visit.

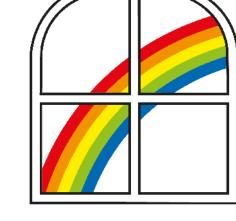

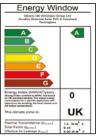
