CAMROSE, GILLIES AND HACKWOOD (PPG)

News: CGH handling of appointment requests has fundamentally changed since 13th June. Patients can still contact CGH by telephone, e-consult, face to face or, via the new DriQ App. However you contact CGH, each request will be reviewed by a team of 3 triage GPs, who will decide the most appropriate action, i.e. with a GP face to face, telephone consultation, nurse appointment, etc. Once triaged, you will be contacted with appointment details. This should dramatically reduce the time it takes to get an appointment with the appropriate medical practitioner. The PPG will be working closely with CGH over the next few months, whilst this new triage process is embedded.

PPG News: we are delighted to report our monthly newsletter will now be featured on the Basingstoke Gazette Community News page, which enables us to reach many more CGH patients with information.

We are pleased to have a lot of people requesting to join our PPG. In order to be representative of the full patient population, we would like to encourage young mothers and, more patients from the under 30 age groups. If you would like to join us, contact us at cghppg.co.uk and fill in the contact form.

Our PPG representative, John Loots, recently sat on the expert panel at Maria Miller's Community Chat on Health. As has

been reported, a wide range of subjects were discussed. Many of the patient concerns expressed at the meeting are representative of a nationwide problem with Primary Health Care being unfit for purpose. Dr. Claire Fuller, a top family doctor, was commissioned by NHS England to conduct a major review of the current system of Primary Health Care. Work is now being done to implement the recommendations made in this publication, aimed at joining up services provided by GP's, Dentists and Pharmacists through integrated care systems. If you watched BBC Panorama on June 13th you will have seen interviews with members of our PPG. This is available to watch on BBC I Player.

Active discussion is taking place with Beggarwood PPG and Practice Managers in respect of merging with CGH PPG. This will make our PPGs stronger by working together, and improve our efficiency for helping patients.

Other News: the new, permanent Health Hub is now open in Festival Place from 1100 to 1700, 7 days a week, at the former Laura Ashley store. It offers a wide range of Health Care services to patients, and will help develop the NHS long term plan for Integrated Care Systems to improve patient access to services. THOUSANDS OF POUNDS RAISED FOR LOCAL COMMUNITY CAUSES

More than £65,000 has been raised by co-operative colleagues and customers in Hampshire.

Thousands of pounds will be shared between 62 separate charities and good causes which were the 2021 local partners of The Co-operative Food stores in Hampshire.

The money was raised through collection pots and fundraising activities at the Southern Co-op stores and will be rounded up to make sure each charity receives at least £1,000.

More than £4,500 was raised at seven stores for Chestnut Tree House - providing care for children and young people with life-limiting conditions in Sussex and South East Hampshire.

Some local causes benefitting from the funding are Alresford Pigs Association, Friends of Four Marks, Hampshire & Isle of Wight Air Ambulance, Hampshire Search and Rescue, Headway Basingstoke, Overton Playgroup, Tadley and District Community Association, The Warren Youth Club.

Every year, each of Southern Co-op's local food stores choose a local partner which aims to create greener, safer, healthier or more inclusive neighbourhoods.

GRANTS TO HELP LOWER ENERGY BILLS FOR LOW INCOME FAMILIES

Grants of up to £25,000 are available for Basingstoke and Deane residents struggling to pay their bills and living in cold homes to make home improvements that could help lower their energy bills.

Residents with a household income of less than £30,000 or on means-tested benefits and living in homes with an energy performance certificate (EPC) rating of D, E, F or G can apply for funding for energy efficiency improvements such as loft and solid wall insulation as well as solar panels and air source heat pumps.

Different amounts are available depending on whether a home is connected to the mains gas network, with people in on-gas homes eligible for up to £10,000 while those in off-gas homes are able to apply for up to £25,000.

The grants are funded by the government through its Green Homes Grant Local Authority Delivery Scheme for ongas homes and its Home Upgrade Grant scheme for off-gas properties. Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is working

with partners through the Warmer Homes Consortium, led by Portsmouth City Council and managed by AgilityEco, to deliver the measures.

The grants do not need to be repaid and cover 100% of the costs of home improvements for people who own their home. Residents renting private accommodation are also eligible, with the grant covering up to two thirds of the costs and their landlord contributing the remaining amount.

Cabinet Member for Environment and Climate Action Cllr Hayley Eachus said: "With the ongoing cost of living crisis and the energy price cap set to go up yet again in the autumn, these fully funded improvements could help residents to stay warm while using less energy, potentially saving hundreds of pounds a year on heating bills and reducing emissions in support of our target to become a net zero carbon borough."

Funding is being distributed on a first-come, first-served basis with measures to be installed by March 2023.

CAN I TAKE
MY CHILD ON
HOLIDAY IF THE
OTHER PARENT
OBJECTS?

This is a question we are often asked when the summer holidays are approaching. The issue for taking a child abroad for a holiday can often be a cause of conflict between separated parents.

If you have a Child Arrangements Order which says your child lives with you, then you can take your child abroad for up to one month as long as there are no other court orders prohibiting this.

What if the holiday has been booked and paid for?

For parents who have previously been able to agree on matters among themselves without requiring legal intervention, the other parent would still have a right of veto over a holiday abroad. This is even if the holiday has been booked.

In practice, the Court will consider what is in the best interest of the child, if parents cannot agree, and can make an order about whether they can or cannot go on a particular holiday. If the holiday is soon you would have to seek an urgent hearing and this is not always simple.

As a guide, here is what the Court will take into consideration; known as the welfare checklist:

• the wishes and feelings of the child concerned

- the child's physical, emotional and educational needs
- the child's age, sex, background and any characteristics of the child which the court considers relevant
- the likely effect on the child of any change in circumstances
- how capable of meeting the child's needs is each of the child's parents and any other person in relation to whom the court considers the question relevant
- any harm that the child has suffered or is at risk of suffering

Under normal circumstances the Court will take a view that a holiday for a child is a good thing to be enjoyed.

COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE

BROADBAND AND PHONE PROBLEMS: The big story affecting our area in June was the disruption caused by damage to phone and Internet cables at the Brighton Hill roundabout. It was very serious, knocking out not only homes and businesses but also Winchester Hospital, and doctors' surgeries. The contractors were drilling a deep hole to take a pile and in the process they fouled multiple ducts carrying the crucial copper and fibre optic cables. The initial claim is that the cables were not mapped accurately. The contractors may also have used ground-penetrating radar but if they did, it failed to warn them of the cables, which were some 2.5 metres below the surface. Because the cables were so deep, the contractors had to dig a trench to give Openreach access to the broken cables. Openreach then worked through the night (I checked!) and the weekend to restore services. The fibre-optic cables were restored first. The copper cables took longer to recover. Hopefully, by the time you read this, all services will be back.

QUESTIONS THAT NEED ANSWERING: The initial priority has been to get the phone and internet services back up and running, especially those serving the NHS.. But I think this incident raises some longer-term questions that will need to be answered, and I am asking them:

- who can be held responsible for this specific instance?
- will compensation be payable to the residents and businesses that lost services for which they have paid?
- do utility companies have an obligation to supply accurate mapping information and what penalties attach if they don't?
- do Council contracts include clauses for penalties to be payable if utility companies supply inaccurate mapping information?
- do Council contracts include penalty clauses if contractors make mistakes that cause the sort of problems that we have experienced in Basingstoke?

My advice is that if you lost service during this emergency, contact your service provider to see whether you can be compensated under the terms of your contract.

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION AGM: one of the victims of the broadband problems was the on-line Annual General Meeting of the Community Association. I logged into the meeting but not enough participants had been able to get through to constitute a quorum, so it was reorganised for a week later. At the time of writing, the outcome is not known.

PASSENGER TRANSPORT FORUM: I attended this forum on 9 June. It discussed the National Bus Strategy. Bus demand is still down after COVID, running at about 80% of previous levels. Hampshire County Council is consulting on a new Local Transport Plan and all residents are invited to take part in this.

BEGGARWOOD SURGERY: The surgery has been introducing its new on-line application called DR IQ and patients should now be able to use it for online consultations for medical conditions. By using the App, patients do not have to phone the surgery and wait in a call-queue. The App is intended to be a more convenient way of accessing GP services such as requesting repeat prescriptions, updating health data from home, such as recent blood pressure readings, asking queries of the reception team and accessing NHS self-care advice. There were reports of

service disruption during its roll-out but hopefully the long-term benefits will be appreciated.

OPEROSE: I watched the Panorama programme about Operose, the company that now runs the Beggarwood surgery. The Chairman of the Patient Participation Group has promised that the issues raised will be placed on the agenda for the next PPG meeting. The programme featured a section about the Gillies Medical Centre, which many residents of Hatch Warren and Beggarwood use, but did not mention Beggarwood.

CONGRATULATIONS TO BRIGHTON HILL SCHOOL.

The recent OFSTED inspection awarded 'outstanding' in three headings and one 'good', confirming that our local secondary school is one of the best in the country. I was a founder governor when the school first opened and very proud of it. It went through a bad stage, but Head Teacher Chris Edwards and his team have turned it round. Parents recognise the progress that has been made, as there is now a waiting list of potential pupils.

LINK ROAD: I think I may have been instrumental is getting a change of position from the County Council about the potential link road through the Camrose site. At first they issued a press statement saying that the money for this had been handed back and it would not be going ahead. After I publicised the situation, the position was modified to say that it might still go ahead if funding can be secured. I believe that the capacity of the Brighton Hill roundabout must be maximised if the A30 corridor is going to cope with the traffic generated by new developments.

LOCAL PLAN: On 9th June I attended a meeting of the Borough Council's Economy, Planning and Housing Committee to offer my views on the emerging local plan. In particular I suggested the the site for warehousing near Junction 7 would be better used as a science park, that a new crossing of the railway line is needed if the Manydown developments are to be sustainable and that the plans to develop Popham Airfield with 3,000 homes is an error. My two minute offering resulted in me being questioned for half an hour!

DIGESTER ODOUR: Reports have continue to come in about odour from the Anaerobic Digester. As part of the investigation, Biogen (the operators) have brought in an independent specialist odour consultant to attend the site, test the performance of the odour abatement systems and undertake a general survey to assess potential sources of the smells. I hope that the consultant finds some scope for improvements - it is not right that neighbours of the plant have to suffer this inconvenience. This will no doubt be discussed at the next liaison meeting.

OLD DOWN: The Borough Council has unanimously agreed that the Cabinet should grant Old Down the status of a Local Nature Reserve. Campaigners look forward to seeing the Council's action plan and finally getting Old Down the protection it deserves.

HOUNSOME FIELDS: Because the developers are building the homes slower than originally planned, the primary school on Hounsome Fields has been put back by a year.

OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

At the time of writing this report (mid-June) it feels as though we haven't had a Spring but by the

time you read this in early July hopefully one can say — "Summer is here". And hopefully both sites now have wonderful displays of wild flowers and many species of butterflies to see and admire. Walking around Beggarwood in early June it was good to see quite a few different species of butterfly, such as:— Common Blue; Brimstone; Large Skipper; Orange Tip and Small Blue. Day-flying moths were also spotted there:- Mother Shipton, 6 Spot Burnet and Burnet Companion.

There wasn't much warmth in the days of May and early June but surprisingly the butterfly numbers in early June on Old Down showed a higher number than last year. But then the Spring weather wasn't too great last year either.

Nationwide there is a decline in butterfly numbers due to loss of habitat and the effects of climate change. So we must do all we can to help butterflies by planting the right flowers and bushes. The Group seeks to plant, spread and encourage the right plants on both sites. Some of the wild flowers and bushes that attract butterflies are Knapweed; Kidney Vetch, Horseshoe Vetch, Lady's Smock (also called Cuckoo Flower) Stinging Nettle and Bramble. All of these can be found on both sites. You can also help by planting butterfly friendly flowers in your garden – garden nurseries now clearly mark those plants that attract butterflies and bees.

The Group does keep up a Facebook page. Sadly it is clear that very, very few people look at this. Perhaps you could make a point of giving it a quick look now and again and also mention its existence to family and friends.

Work Parties: For Old Down we meet outside Old Down Hall every Thursday 10-12noon and for Beggarwood at the café on the first Tuesday of the month 9-12noon. Please do come and join us. Check the website for further information. And please do look at the Group's Facebook page for interest.



At the time of writing, the YIIs are over halfway through their GCSEs, plans have been made for Y5 & Y6 taster days, new student editors have been appointed and new Student Reporters have joined the team, sports teams are competing at County level and the excitement is building for Sports Day and Rewards Week.



SPIRITUALLY SPEAKING

"Go on then, what is faith?" asked a long-standing friend who delights in challenging my beliefs. I don't think he really knows what he believes himself and I'm pretty sure he's a bit jealous because he thinks I've got The Big Questions sorted. I haven't really of course (who has) but it's fun to make him think I have.

"Faith" I opined "is the confidence that something unprovable is true. I know that God exists and that He is a very important part of my life and wellbeing but I can't prove it"

"Well it can't be true then can it, if you can't prove it!" my friend harrumphed but then went a bit quite when I said "I can't prove air exists but you'd soon know if it wasn't there"

Our desire for proof of stuff is very deep seated and humankind has an insatiable appetite for clear answers. Science has hugely improved the lives of millions of people both in terms of health and longevity. Yet despite the enormous advances over the past 100 years we are still unsure of much and today's scientific fact may be tomorrow's old wives' tale. We also want things explained in black and white terms. "This is good for you". "That is bad for you". Messages that are easily understood but almost certainly incorrect unless every single facet of your being corresponds exactly to the average.

At points in the past 70 years we have been told that

- a) Smoking is good for asthma
- b) Pregnant women should drink Guinness, as it contains iron
- c) Passing electricity through the brain is a cure for depression

In fact there is very little that we can be absolutely certain is true today and will never change. My faith is that God is there for everyone and that that will never change

It would be nice to know for certain that God exists, to be sure that there is a heaven after death and to know that whatever happens, it's for the best - and actually many Christians do know for sure that these facts are true but for millions of people they are accepted as true though faith, trust, belief rather than categoric certainty.

Why do some people have faith and others don't? Maybe some find it easier to accept abstract ideas? Perhaps those who hear God's call to faith are just more compassionate by nature and therefore more willing to forgive others, to accept others as they are and thereby follow the teachings of Christ.

St Thomas Aquinas probably called it right when he said "To one who has faith, no explanation is necessary. To one without faith, no explanation is possible"

I guess that at the end of the day you either have faith or you don't and we may never know why some believe and some doubt. What I can say with absolute certainty is that knowing God and having Him in my life is definitely "good for me".

ST. MICHAEL'S HOSPICE UNDERTAKES CRITICAL UPGRADES TO INPATIENT UNIT

St. Michael's Hospice will undertake a refurbishment of its Inpatient Unit this summer. The project will see all existing corridor flooring replaced, new lighting and redecoration.

North Hampshire's only adult hospice is celebrating its 30th Anniversary this year. Over these 30 years the requirements governing infection control have been constantly evolving. To bring the Hospice up to date and transform the environment for staff, patients and visitors the carpet, lighting and decoration of the inpatient unit will be replaced. This refurbishment was planned prior to COVID in 2020 but postponed due to the pressure for beds the virus caused on healthcare system.

These upgrades must now be undertaken as a matter of priority. For the two-week period the refurbishment will take, the Hospice will care for our patients in the community via increasing the workforce capacity of its Hospice at Home team. The safety and comfort of its patients and staff were paramount in making its decision.

lain Cameron, Chief Executive of St. Michael's said "We have planned this progressive refurbishment with our healthcare partners and have the total support of our staff to ensure that patients will continue to receive the highest standard of round the clock specialist palliative care. We have communicated widely to our supporters and volunteers in the community to explain how the refurbishment will benefit patients and their families. By making these positive building improvements we will dramatically improve the physical working environment for patients and the dedicated teams delivering care to our patients".

Philippa Aslet, Director of Nursing at St. Michael's Hospice is passionate about the transformation process. "The refurbishment project is an exceptional opportunity to really improve the environment in which patients are cared in. All the teams are very excited and looking forward to seeing the result. For the duration of the refurbishment our clinical staff who work tirelessly delivering exceptional care to patients on the inpatient unit will work in support of their community colleagues. This ensures we have the additional capacity required to meet patient needs. In addition, we will continue to provide a 24hr a day phone line manned by specialist clinical staff to provide support to patients and families. Whilst it can sometimes be more challenging delivering care in the community, we are confident that there will be minimal interruption to the support our Hospice provides to the community. At the end of the refurbishment process we will have a hugely improved environment that is easier to maintain, meets the latest infection control requirements yet remains welcoming for patients who visit to receive vital treatment, care and support."

The work will begin on July 1st, and is scheduled to last 14 days.

RESTAURANT REVIEW

WELLINGTON FARM SHOP

Everyone has faced it sometime; deciding on where to meet friends for lunch. Especially tricky when living some distance apart and so it was when meeting some friends from Reading. Somewhere in between made sense and so the café in the Wellington Farm shop was an obvious choice.

It can be found westwards from the roundabout where the single A33 becomes the Swallowfield bypass dual carriageway.

The café claims to use hand selected ingredients from the farm shop that you must pass through to get to the café at the back that has views of the Wellington estate from the outdoor terrace. Ours was an inside table for which Madam had made a reservation online.

All day breakfasts, and substantial hot dishes are there to tempt the hungry horses and with cakes and coffee, but we decided on a middle course from their offering. Madam's salad was roasted beetroot and goat's cheese that used pine nut aged Balsamic dressing while I had sandwich of chicken breast, streaky bacon and avocado, with lettuce, tomato and mayo on toasted Focaccia. All very trendy you might say, but really tasty. For drinks I had a bottle of Stella Artois and Madam a latte coffee.

The extensive drinks menu includes wine and non-alcoholic beer but do not be tempted to request a shandy as they will bring a bottle of lemonade and a bottle of beer for the customer to mix themselves as was explained "we are not a pub."

The cost to us was £28.40 which I considered good value for the quality we enjoyed.

Worth going? This is a popular café open seven days a week but

with some time restrictions on what food is available and it is recommended that a table booking is made at busy times. All menus, including one for children, can be seen on their web site.


