PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP UPDATE

Things have been a little strange at the practice during October and will, possibly, carry forward into November. As you can imagine the PPG has been somewhat underwhelmed by the lack of communication from the CGHB management to its patients and the sudden action involving DriQ and other random communications. However, in trying to bring some clarity to the situation, we offer the following.

As you may know there has been an IT outage within the Practice affecting the functioning of the Dr iQ App and the Practice website and affecting the whole of the Operose company nationwide. This has led to the abrupt withdrawal of the Dr iQ App just as it was becoming a useful and trusted tool. We have asked the Practice for an explanation for patients and this is what they have said:

Dr.iQ patient update

"We want to offer our patients the best digital experience that we can. To help us do this, we will soon be releasing a new and improved Dr.iQ App. The new App will be on a new technology platform using another NHS Approved supplier. You will be able to download the new Dr.iQ App shortly — the practice will tell us when this will be. If you receive text messages from the practice, please keep an eye out for updates.

We would encourage you to download and register with the NHS App in the meantime, if you are not already a user of this. You will be asked to verify your identity; this is to ensure that your data remains secure. You will be able to use your NHS App login details for the new Dr.iQ App. Doing this now will help you to access the Dr.iQ App, quicker, when it is available."

Text messages have been issued to some patients advising that they are in various coloured clinical teams without any explanation of what this means. However, after some "chasing" we are pleased to be able to bring some insight into the situation regarding Teams and an explanation/comment from the practice. See below:

Teams: "All patients have a 'named responsible GP' at the practice who work within a team. These teams are site based and colours. The reception and administrative team will always try to book you in with your named GP first. Failing this, they will book you in with a GP within your registered team. You are still able to request to see another GP if you would like. The practice is currently reallocating patients within teams due to a full complement of GP staff."

We hope the above gives you some insight into the current situation but it still leaves a few outstanding questions:

- Why is the Practice website and all the other Operose websites down?
- Why withdraw Dr.iQ without immediately replacing it with the "new and improved" App?
- Can we really trust the new version of DriQ when it is released without understanding why the original was withdrawn with such haste?

We know some of our local elected County Council officials have been in contact with the local Integrated Care Board (ICB) to try to gain an understanding of the situation and we plan to keep you informed if we get any news.

Obviously, because of the above the Practice phone lines have been very busy with waits of over an hour in some circumstances and promised call backs sometimes not happening. We plan to raise this with the Practice during our next meeting in early December. Meanwhile your feedback would be appreciated via email at the above address.

COUNCILLOR UPDATES

WAREHOUSES APPLICATION: The most important piece of news this month is that the planning application for warehouses near Junction 7 of the M3 has been approved. I attended the Development Control committee and spoke against the proposals, However, the Borough Councillors voted by 6 to 4 to grant permission, saying that the changes to the landscaping were now sufficient to address the previous reasons for refusal.

MY FEARS ABOUT THE WAREHOUSE **DEVELOPMENT:** We now have housing all the way down to the A30, in the Hounsome Fields development. The warehouses will most certainly be visible from the new homes. The huge buildings are also adjacent to the Dummer conservation area and will impact on it, not least at night when light pollution will be unavoidable. I feel that a better use for the site would have been a science park, given that it is across the road from the entrance of the proposed new hospital. It remains to be seen how the development will impact on our area including road works during the building phase and increased traffic once the warehouses are occupied.

PARTICIPATION Another major event this past month has been the non-availability of the Dr IQ application which patients of Camrose, Gillies, Hackwood and Beggarwood surgeries are encouraged to use. The Patient Participation Group has issued its latest newsletter, and has commented on the outage that has affected service levels at the surgeries. It says that 'things have been a little strange at the practice' and it 'has been somewhat underwhelmed by the lack of communication from the CGHB management to its patients and the sudden action involving Dr. iQ and other random communications.' The management of the practice have said that they will soon be releasing a new and improved Dr. iQ app. It will run on a new technology platform using another NHS approved supplier. Patients will be able to download the new Dr. iQ app shortly. I have suggested questions to the PPG that need to be answered, including who verifies the application as secure. I also attended a meeting with County Councillor Kim Taylor at which we put our shared concerns to the Integrated Care Board.

OLD DOWN MEETING: I attended the Borough Council's consultation meeting about Old Down, and took the opportunity to ask why Old Down still does not have the

protection of being a Local Nature Reserve as does Beggarwood Park on 'our' side of the A30. I received an interesting answer that I had not heard before - Old Down doesn't need to be a Local Nature Reserve as it is already a Site of Interest for Nature Conservation (SINC). I am not persuaded by this: there have been many examples of SINCs being built on or eroded, so I think the fight must go on.

BROADMERE ROAD ADOPTIONS: The legal agreement between the County Council and the developers has been updated, along with the adoption drawings. The County is now undertaking final land checks. Assuming all results come back as expected, the next step will be to send out the draft agreement for signing and completion. This issue is heading towards completion but, I have to say, with glacial slowness, which I find very frustrating.

GOLF COURSE DEVELOPMENT: The Borough Council has granted permission for phase 3 of the Bloor Homes development on the old Golf Course site. This will see 485 new homes built, stretching down from the new Hounsome Fields roundabout to the M3.

TITHE MEADOW: A local resident has kindly confirmed to me that work has been carried out to make good the drain in the brickwork section of the road that had been collapsing. I had requested that this be addressed.

BRIGHTON HILL TRAFFIC LIGHTS: Having been told 'by the end of the year', the changes to the traffic lights on the roundabout were completed very quickly. These now allow the 'green' periods to vary in response to the weight of traffic being observed, which therefore increases the capacity of the roundabout.

ROUNDABOUT VERGES: Hampshire's contractors have also been tasked with adding more topsoil and seed to verges at the Brighton Hill roundabout to improve their general condition. They will remove more of the weeds that grow there. These activities will be completed under localised traffic management whilst workers are present.

FLOODING ON KEMPSHOTT ROUNDABOUT: During the torrential rain last month, the roundabout flooded badly again, with the inside lane virtually impassable. I think the flood cleared more quickly than it used to, but there is clearly a problem still. I am trying to find out whether the water came from the road or a Thames Water pipe that caused problems here before.

McDONALD'S: I have made multiple checks at the Hatch Warren Retail Park following the opening of the new McDonald's. When I was there I saw no problems in terms of litter

or anti-social behaviour. I have not received any complaints from nearby houses.

PARISH COUNCILS?: Speculation is rife that the government is planning to scrap the 'two-tier' local government structure and some of the smaller unitary authorities. Any move towards larger Councils will increase the disconnect between Members and their constituents, so I return to a discussion point I have raised before - should we be looking to set up Parish Councils in the areas of Basingstoke that currently do not have them? The current situation is that the new Golf Course development, Hounsome Fields and a sliver of Beggarwood are covered by Dummer Parish Council but Hatch Warren and Beggarwood have no such representation. On issues such as planning, Parish Councils can offer an important local voice.

FIREWORKS SPECTACULAR: on a lighter note: with family members I attended the Community Association's annual fireworks display on 2nd November. The Association reported that the event was sold out and an announcement on the night stated that over 5,000 people were present, which is a record. With numbers that high, it required the marshalling and organisation to be first class, which they were, helped by many volunteers. The fireworks themselves were very special with a memorable finale.

MERRY CHRISTMAS: as this is the last issue of the Rabbiter this year, I take this opportunity to wish everyone in Hatch Warren



and Beggarwood a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Something I am passionate about is ensuring that residents are fully aware of the processes and rules that guide planning and other services; so often our frustrations as constituents come from being disconnected from how these work, so decisions seem unfair and arbitrary. If anyone has questions of this sort, please do drop into one of my monthly Ask Me Anything Cllr Surgery sessions to find out more.

Fortunately, much of the rest of this month's calendar was happier and more successful. I visited a Guide group this week to talk about influencing community change and helped out at the always-amazing Hatch Warren firework display for which the team deserve huge applause and thanks. I met with Basingstoke Community Radio to discuss community outreach: they are well worth a listen online. I was also honoured, alongside our Mayor, to unveil a Basingstoke Heritage Society Blue Plaque for our first female Mayor and speak to those present about the power and importance of shattering glass ceilings, then and now.

The CGHB surgery PPG continues to do great work in communicating help available for carers and I was pleased to volunteer at one of their regular surgery drop-ins. If you care for someone I urge you to check out the collated resources online at cghppg. weebly.com which is a brilliant one-stop-shop for all local carer info.

Finally for now, I want to let you know about the Hampshire County Council survey now running on barriers to walking and cycling. Having recently bought a second-hand bike and promised myself I'd start to dust off skills not utilised since I was twelve, I think it's vital as many people as possible respond to assist County in ensuring walking and cycle routes are as accessible and well-maintained as possible – and nobody knows the area like residents do! Walking and cycling are key ways we can all improve our health, conserve the environment and save money at the same time. This is especially important for those who – for example – have mobility issues or use buggies or pushchairs. The survey is open until 22nd December and you can find it on hants.gov.uk.

PROBUS VISIT TO D-DAY HQ

In the 80th Anniversary year of the D-Day landings an inspiring visit to the war time HQ brought home the realities of the largest amphibious assault in history.

A group of members and families from the Probus Club of Basingstoke had an impressive visit to Southwick House (locally pronounced "Suthick") positioned five miles north of Portsmouth that had a pivotal role in the planning of D-Day.

It was the Supreme Headquarters of the main allied commanders, led by Allied Supreme Commander General Dwight D Eisenhower, Naval Commander-in-Chief Admiral Ramsey, Army Commanderin-Chief General Montgomery, and Commander-in-Chief Allied Air Force, Air Chief Marshal Leigh-Mallory. The grounds became the Main Tactical Base for the 21st Army Group for their forthcoming invasion plans.

Richard Callaghan, the curator, gave an extensive narrative about the map room that still contains the enormous graphic showing the invasion plans. His talk was interwoven with anecdotes about incidents involving the main characters that gave life to this history lesson.

How General Eisenhower became very close to his English driver Kay Summersby and was prevented by the Republican party from taking her back to America, as they declared that they could not accept a divorcee to run for the Presidency. He remained married to Maime and had two terms as President of the United States.

Deception was used to convince the German high command that the invasion would come across the shortest route from Kent to Pas de Calais which caused German divisions to move from the Normandy region.

James Stagg was the meteorologist providing weather forecasts to the senior planning group. As a civilian it was thought he would have difficulty in ensuring his predictions would be taken seriously so he was presented with the uniform of a RAF Group Captain. It was Stagg that convinced General Eisenhower to postpone the assault from the planned day of 5th June to 6th June 1944.

6,000 ships were involved moving from all regions of southern England to the main dispersal area that became known as Piccadilly Circus and then had to pass through corridors cleared through minefields in the Channel. Due to detailed planning only seven ships were involved in collisions.

Despite the break in the weather there was still a swell, and the floating Sherman tanks were launched too far out from the shore resulting in only four out of thirty-two reaching the beach. It had been necessary to ensure that the beach would support such vehicles by nighttime investigations in the previous weeks that had not been spotted by the land-based Germans.

In the adjacent bar room, the original weather maps were on the wall along with other memorabilia including models of two LCT (Landing Craft Tank) ships that were the subject of a talk some years ago by a Probus Club member. He had trained as a radio operator on such vessels whose role was getting armoured vehicles on to the beaches because their bow dropped on to the shore. Once unloaded they could raise their bow and reverse off the beach ready to return to England for another cargo of armoured vehicles.

The successful completion over several days of Operation Overlord on the Normandy beaches was the beginning of the end of WW2.

No doubt you are all getting ready for Christmas which is almost upon us. Old Down Wildlife Group

wishes A VERY HAPPY CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR to all its members and to all users of Old Down.

As you know Old Down is now a separate volunteer group from Beggarwood however Old Down Group will still report in The Rabbiter on wildlife subjects and also on issues affecting Old Down which might interest you as we are only just across the road.

Basingstoke Council has recently completed a public consultation on its proposals for some landscaping and new recreational equipment and amenities on Old Down. The Group does not support these proposals. The Group is of the opinion that the two sites - Beggarwood and Old Down - should be different and provide different experiences for the public. Beggarwood is a park providing a selection of recreational facilities as well as natural areas but Old Down is primarily a place for nature with its large area of

wildflower meadow. Old Down should be left as it is. The Group is hoping that most people will agree with this view.

The wonderful autumn colours are now over and the trees are bare of leaves - winter is here. One plus at this time of year is that it is easy to spot birds they can't hide within the canopy and behind bunches of leaves. Two species that are quite often seen on Beggarwood, but not so often on Old Down, are the Green Woodpecker and the Great Spotted Woodpecker. Perhaps Old Down is too open for them and they prefer more trees. There are of course other species of woodpecker such as the Lesser Spotted Woodpecker (much smaller than the Great Spotted) and the Wryneck but these are not common so you won't see these two around here.

Just in case you are interested we have weekly work parties on Thursdays 10-12noon meeting outside Old Down Hall (but not in the rain!). We also run some weekend work parties. The next dates are 17 November and 15 December – meeting outside Old Down Hall at 10 am. You are welcome to join us. Taming the invader

We don't usually have any scheduled work parties during the Summer, apart from events such as our Kids' Bug Hunts and seed collecting. This year, however, a start was made on trying to keep the Ragwort under control. This is a naturalised 'invasive' that will take over if not kept in check. There is a lot of this on Down Grange Meadow and we will never remove all of it as it is used as the food plant of the Cinnabar Moth. It is also a useful late season nectar source for all kinds of bees, butterflies, moths, hoverflies, etc. It is important, though, to limit the amount of seed it spreads. It is a biennial, which means we must do this again next year to be effective.

Down Grange Meadow is included in our programme of regular work parties. We'll be there on Sundays 8th December, 12th and 26th January (10 00 – 12 30) and on Thursday, 30th January (14 00 – 16 30). The meeting point is the Meadow's Homesteads Road entrance near St Mark's Church.






I endeavour to show all manner of eating establishments in my restaurant review to suit a variety of tastes and costs. It was following a recommendation that this is probably the best value breakfast to be had in Basingstoke that we visited Charlie's Café and although we arrived after 12.30 pm the three versions of breakfast were still available to order.

This establishment is tucked away and clearly set up to cater for local employees of the surrounding industrial estate. But it is clean and tidy and can seat up to thirty and like us there were several retired people also enjoying their lunches.

Madam had a cheese omelette with fries while I had chilli con carne with rice and fries. A mug of good coffee completed our needs for a cost of £17.00. Afterwards Madam thanked the two ladies who cook most things to order, that the omelette was the best she had eaten out of the house. My chilli was fine, too.

Along with the three alternative breakfasts there was a wide array of what might be termed, fast food, with nine types of burgers and alternative fillings for baked potatoes, paninis, baguettes or toasties and children's selection, but no desserts.

Did it meet our expectations for quality and value – you bet it did.

A LOCAL GHOST STORY FOR CHRISTMAS

Many places lay claim to the legend of the Mistletoe Bough including Minster Lovell



near Oxford, but Bramshill House near Hook has more claim than most, and numbers the ghost of the Mistletoe bough amongst its 14 or so spectres.

One of these is the white lady who has been seen many times around the house, and who brings with her the strong fragrance of flowers — many say lily of the valley. She is said to be the ghost of a young bride married on Christmas Eve who died during her wedding party. The guests took part in a game of hide and seek around the house, and she hid herself in a heavy chest. Once in, she could not lift the lid to get out, and no-one found her. When found, 50 years later, she was clutching a sprig of mistletoe in her hand.

A variation on this claims that the white lady is in fact the ghost of Genevre Orsini, a 15 year old Italian bride, and that when the chest was imported from Italy to Bramshill her ghost came with it.

The sad tale was immortalised in a Victorian song and many stories. Even the Romanian royal family are reported to have been troubled by the presence of this particular ghost. Apparently while staying there after WWII, King Michael asked for a different bedroom for his children who were being disturbed by the white lady who walked through their rooms each night.



SPIRITUALLY SPEAKING

"Love come down" at Christmas

Does it sometimes feel that we are in a hurry to reach the next season?

You may have been surprised, as I was to see in early September, Christmas bits and pieces, including mince pies on sale in the supermarket.

And immediately after Halloween it was full of Christmas, with goodies, presents, wrapping paper and advent calendars. Now before I go any further this isn't a bah-humbug post!

It's all too easy to get caught up in the busyness of the season and not have any space to think about what we are celebrating and preparing for. I'm actually writing this article on Remembrance Sunday and well before Advent starts. Advent is a four-week period where we wait expectantly and prepare ourselves for the Christ child to come among us again (and also look for the return of Christ).

One of our traditions at St Mark's church is that we decorate the church with our theme for Christmas – this year its "Love come down" and St Mark's will be decorated with Danish hearts (julehjerter). Do have a look at them online. I love the way that the two colours of the hearts fit together, making me think about Jesus being both God and divine but coming down in human form as Jesus. Immanuel Church will once again have their stained-glass nativity panels. Do look out for them as you go past!

Jesus showed us how to love people no matter who they are. This is both the shock and surprise of the Christian faith. No one is excluded and all are welcomed into God's family. Jesus lived, loved and saved people even if they betrayed and killed him.

The nativity story is full of shocks and surprises; a young woman says yes to God knowing that she may be deserted by her family and fiancé. A man was willing to take on a child that's not his own. Shepherds were surprised by Angels on a hillside and wise foreigners searched for a king, not born in a palace but somewhere much humbler:

Loving people that we don't like or agree with is really hard. And if we think organising who is going to spend time with whom over the Christmas period, we can appreciate how difficult it can be reconcile countries or be an arbiter of peace.

Over the last few years, we have seen how disconnected and alienated countries, communities and families have become. But Christmas gives us a reason to reflect and think about how we can love like Jesus loved; unconditionally and sacrificially. All of us can work on being generous and kind, taking an extra step to help others.

IT WAS THIRTY YEARS AGO TODAY

By the third issue of 'the Rabbiter' in December 1992, many of the characteristics of our area were settling down or being planned. The major news reported in Issue 3 was that more shops were in the offing, to go on the west side of Wallop Drive. Planning permission had been given for four units (non-food) in what we now know as the Hatch Warren Retail Park.

The non-food condition was recently lifted for the unit that has been occupied by McDonald's. There would be parking for 260 cars — a space that was mis-used by car meets in recent years, which necessitated the locking of the security gates.

In 1992, many people hoped that Hatch Warren would get a Post Office. This never happened, of course, but eventually one was provided in the Co-op store that opened many years later in Beggarwood.

At the same time, Sainsbury's were seeking planning permission to extend their complex. This would result in extra retail units being constructed on the Pinnell Close side of the building – and, if I remember correctly, they were destined to provoke a major row about what should go in them.

The newly-opened Community Centre was getting into its stride, and one of the suggestions for future activities was a beer festival. The Rabbiter carried a call for volunteers to organise it. This idea proved to be very popular, and the beer / lager festival has become a regular feature of our local calendar.

The youth clubs at the Community Centre were now operating, with a call for volunteers to come and help, and Immanuel with St Mark's church was meeting there each Sunday. This was before St Mark's school was built, with facilities to host church services there.

And to demonstrate that some things never change ... the third issue of 'the Rabbiter' reported concerns about vehicles speeding on Woodbury Road and Long Cross Lane. Not only that, parking on these 30mph roads was ill-disciplined and causing accidents. Subsequently, when Beggarwood was being planned, the love-them-or-hate-them 'build-outs' were installed to slow traffic and deter rat-running.

Other activities advertised were a Christmas Bazaar, a Craft Fayre and a Pantomime put on by the Proteus Theatre Company (which is still operating, based in the Fairfields Arts Centre). The bazaar has grown into a major event each Christmas, and the Craft Fayre has moved to a different time of year, but sadly, the Pantos have faded away. My recollection is that they were great fun.


